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PREFACE

Goa University was established under the Goa University Act of 1984 (Act No. 7 of 1984) and commenced operations on 1st June 1985. The University took over the enhanced role of the Centre of Post-Graduate Instruction and Research (CPIR), which was set up after the liberation of Goa in December 1961, from the University of Bombay (now Mumbai) in June 1962. Since 1985, Goa University has offered Graduate and Post-Graduate studies and research Programmes. The University is included under Section 2(f) of the UGC Act, 1956 and also awarded the status 12 B of the UGC Act, 1956 by the University Grants Commission. The University provides higher education in the state of Goa. It is located on the Taleigao Plateau overlooking the Zuari estuary on a picturesque campus spread over 402 acres with state-of-the-art infrastructure including faculty blocks, administrative building, library, sports facilities, student hostels, bank, post office, staff quarters, and Campus-Wide Internet connectivity with strong bandwidth is available for all 24 x 7. The University has implemented the curriculum as per the NEP-2020 policy and has given a provision for multiple exit/entry options in its Degree programs by adopting the Academic Bank of Credit Policy. The University also encourages students to opt for online courses on SWAYAM and other approved portals of the Government of India. The University conducted various online activities through the Directorate of Digital Learning and Initiatives, like Unigoa Pathshala - <https://www.unigoa.ac.in/c/unigoa-pathshala.html>. Goa University holds the distinction of Multidisciplinary Education and Research University (MERU) status, backed by a major Rs.100 Cr. grant sanctioned by the Central Government under Pradhan Mantri Uchchatar Shiksha Abhiyan (PM-USHA) Scheme.

Over the years, the University has steadily expanded its reach, both in terms of the number of affiliated colleges - [professional](#) and [general education](#) numbering 69, as well as the diversity of courses offered. These colleges offer various courses leading to a Degree at the Graduate or Post-Graduate level. Some of them are also recognised as research centres to offer PhD. Programmes.

University Ranking

Goa University is currently accredited by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) in India with an A+ Grade with CGPA of 3.30/4.0. The National Institutional Ranking Framework (NIRF) 2025, an initiative of the Ministry of Human Resource Development, the Government of India, ranked Goa University in its 2025 cycle of ranking Indian Higher Educational Institutions. Goa University was placed in the [State Public University Rank-band of 51-100](#).

QS ranking <https://www.topuniversities.com/universities/goa-University> - has ranked Goa University in the 682 rank band in the QS Asia Ranking 2026. In Southern Asia, Goa University is ranked 207 by the QS Rankings. Goa University has been rated as “Very High” in Research output.

In the Times Higher Education Ranking <https://www.timeshighereducation.com/world-University-rankings/goa-University>, Goa University holds an overall rank of 1501+ worldwide among the 2092 Universities in the world in the Times Higher Education World University Ranking 2026. Goa University has been ranked 83rd in India among the 107 Universities that participated from India in the year 2025. Teaching is the highest-ranked pillar, followed by Research Quality of Goa University in the Times Higher Education Ranking. The University has been ranked 601-800 in Asia Ranking 2026. The University has been ranked in the 801-1000 band in Quality Education 2026, 801-1000 band in Gender Equality 2025, and 1001-1500 band in Partnership for Goals 2025 under Impact Rankings on SDGs.

'India Today' ranked Goa University at the 22nd among the General (Government) Universities in India (in 2025). 'The Week' ranked Goa University in 2026 at 28th position Nationally among Government (Central and State) Multidisciplinary Universities and at 39th rank in India in the Overall category (Multidisciplinary Universities), 22nd in India in the State University category (Multidisciplinary Universities), and 6th in the Western Zone (Multidisciplinary Universities). Goa University is ranked 35th by the 'Outlook I Care Best University Ranking 2026' among the government universities.

University Schools

The University, on its campus, has [Ten Schools](#) which were formed by the amalgamation of traditional Departments to allow the organic evolution of new courses. These Schools offer various Programmes leading to Under-Graduate Degrees (3), Master's Degrees (49), Doctor of Philosophy Degrees (PhD) (30), and various Certificate/Diploma Programmes in various Disciplines. The University has made a significant impact at the national level in various areas of specialisation and draws students from across the country. Geographically, Goa is located in an ecologically sensitive region along the Western Ghats and the Arabian Sea. Goa University has appropriately emerged as an important resource centre for research in the field of flora and fauna endemic to this region, as well as the marine environment. The Ministry of Earth Sciences has recognised Goa University's significant contribution in this domain, as a consequence of which a Centre of Excellence was established in Marine Microbiology. The Schools at the University have developed excellent research facilities, and large funding for research is received from Central Government agencies such as the University Grants Commission, the Department of Science and Technology, the Ministry of Earth Sciences, the Ministry of Environmental Sciences and Climate Change, the Department of Biotechnology, etc. For a relatively small University, Goa University attracts generous funding for research projects from national funding agencies, which reflects the high quality of research undertaken by the faculty at the University (http://info.unigoa.ac.in/proj_yrwise.php). Goa University has been at the forefront of its societal activities. University has adopted five villages in Goa under Unnat Bharat Abhiyan and, under this

scheme, has carried out various activities that directly benefit the villagers <https://www.unigoa.ac.in/a/directorate-of-unnat-bharat-abhiyaan-duba.html>. The University has taken up a project on mussel farming at Marcaim village. The University has successfully implemented a student summer internship program through its curriculum since 2018, and several students have been trained in this program. Very recently, the University completed a community project on the revival of Puran Sheti in Sattari Taluka, which benefits many villagers.

PM-USHA Scheme Projects

Goa University has been selected under the Scheme of Pradhan Mantri Uchchatar Shiksha Abhiyan (PM-USHA) under Multi-disciplinary Education and Research Universities (MERU) with financial support of Rs 100 crore in February 2024 <https://pmusha.education.gov.in/pm-usha/#/home>

‘Goa University Research Park Unit’ “GURU”

Goa University Research Park Unit [‘GURU’](#), has been set up to coordinate activities of the University related to innovation, incubation, entrepreneurship and industrial interaction. GURU provides a platform for industries to join the University to build on intellectual capital. GURU is to serve as a link between industry and academia. It provides a platform to use knowledge, expertise, and resources for supporting innovation, research and development to achieve social, health and industrial impact in Goa.

GURU is set up to achieve the primary objectives of the Startup Policy of the Government of Goa. This park will accelerate innovation and entrepreneurship culture in students by bringing industries and academia on a common platform. Goa University in association with the Directorate of Higher Education, Government of Goa, has established a Bio-incubator, Health-Incubator and IT-incubator under GURU. [UNIGOA Knowledge and Innovation Foundation \(UKIF\)](#) is established as a Section 8 (not-for-profit) company. It aims to promote entrepreneurial activity in Goa University and commercialization of R&D efforts across all disciplines. It also extensively undertakes pre-incubation activities.

- To identify, encourage, facilitate, and support innovators and entrepreneurs, for creating self-sustainable business models.
- To develop, frame and implement policies to support start-ups and entrepreneurship.
- To extend state-of-the-art laboratories and other world class incubation and pre-incubation facilities to innovators, startups, and entrepreneurs.
- To actively support any potential innovator in Goa to participate in innovation and entrepreneurship (I&E) related activities, thus encouraging start-ups and entrepreneurship as a career option.

Research Publication and H-Index

The strength of Goa University lies in the number of research publications and the H-index. Goa University has so far published over 7,400 research publications (including PhD theses), and the full texts of these are available in the unique [Publications Repository](#). There are very few state universities in India that have made such an effort to consolidate the information. There is a multi-fold increase in the visibility of the University with its publications on the repository. The current H-index, as per the Web of Science database, from just 2332 journal publications out of 7400, is 83.

University initiatives under the Ministry of Human Resource Development (MHRD)

In addition to the conventional Graduate and Post-Graduate Programmes, Goa University has also taken initiatives to provide innovative Programmes. Some noteworthy initiatives are the National Resource Centre in Marine Science under the Ministry of Human Resource Development (MHRD) for the professional development of higher education using the MOOCs platform SWAYAM, the State Resource Centre for Women funded by the Ministry of Women and Child Development, the Government of India as well as Directorate of Women and Child Development, the Government of Goa, the Study India Programme with Nihon University of Japan, etc. Goa University launched the Visiting Research Professors Programme (VRPP) in 2013-14 to bring luminaries in the fields of liberal arts and literature, social and natural sciences, and other fields. The visiting professors interact with students, deliver lectures, offer courses, and work on collaborative research projects or stimulate the creation of art installations and music performances with faculty and students. These visiting professors are found to generate a creative environment in learning and contemporary knowledge production practices with their intellectual and aesthetic endeavours. The Programme is being supported by the Directorate of Art and Culture and the Directorate of Higher Education, the Government of Goa, and is open to the general public. Goa University has a functional alumni association that helps the students in various activities. Goa University is well equipped with sports facilities, and it also conducts activities for all colleges in Goa.

Green Campus Initiatives and EV Infrastructure /Waste Management Practice

Goa University has implemented a range of green campus initiatives focused on renewable energy, water conservation, and waste management to support long-term sustainability. Although dedicated public EV charging stations are currently located mainly in nearby areas such as Taleigao and Panaji rather than within the campus itself, the University continues to serve as a strong example of ecological stewardship in Goa. Under initiatives supported by the Directorate of Higher Education, the University has adopted solar energy solutions to reduce dependence on conventional power sources, including the installation of rooftop solar panels across campus buildings to lower electricity consumption and

carbon emissions. A key highlight is the University Science Instrumentation Centre (USIC), which operates entirely on solar power, along with approximately 83 solar-powered streetlights that promote energy-efficient outdoor lighting. In terms of water conservation, the University has implemented an extensive rooftop rainwater harvesting system and percolation pits to recharge groundwater, ensuring water availability and self-sufficiency during dry periods. Its waste management practices align with the Swachh Campus policy, incorporating waste segregation, regular cleanliness drives, and safe disposal of e-waste and hazardous materials to minimise environmental impact. Spread across around 427 acres, the campus supports rich biodiversity, with initiatives such as annual plantation drives, including Vanamahotsav, helping to maintain ecological balance. However, the availability of dedicated EV charging infrastructure within the campus remains limited, despite growing interest among students and stakeholders. Nearby locations like Taleigao and Panaji provide alternative access to public EV charging stations. Encouragingly, the Government of Goa supports EV infrastructure through its Electric Mobility Promotion Policy, which offers incentives such as capital subsidies for solar-powered EV charging stations, creating strong potential for future on-campus integration.

2. The candidate must pass the Master's examination in the relevant subject.
3. Admissions for PhD. Programmes are held twice a year.
4. Interviews will be conducted to allot seats to the JRF/M.Phil. /NET/SET/GATE/GPAT/ GU-PET etc.
5. Candidates who have qualified for JRF/M.Phil. /NET/SET/GATE/GPAT shall be exempted only from the GU-PET.

The University may decide to increase the number of seats depending on demand and available infrastructure.

RESERVATION UNDER VARIOUS CATEGORIES

Reservation of seats for admission to the various Programmes of study shall be on the basis of the Reservation Policy of the Goa State Government. Candidates applying for admission under the Reserved Categories shall be required to submit a valid Certificate to that effect issued by the Officer of the rank of the Deputy Collector or any other authorised Officer as notified by the Government of Goa.

1. 2% of seats in each of the Programmes of study, subject to a minimum of one seat, shall be reserved for candidates belonging to the SC Category of Goa State.
2. 12% of seats in each of the Programmes of study, subject to a minimum of one seat, shall be reserved for candidates belonging to the ST Category of Goa State.
3. 27% of total seats for admission to various Programmes of study shall be reserved for candidates belonging to the Other Backward Classes Non-Creamy Layer (OBC-NCL) of the State of Goa.
4. 5% of the total seats subject to a minimum of one seat for admission to the various Programmes of study shall be reserved for Persons with Disabilities (PWD) candidates.
5. 10% of seats shall be made available for candidates of other Indian Universities; a maximum of 2 seats shall be notified for each Programme.
6. 10% of total seats shall be reserved for the Economically Weaker Section of the Unreserved Category (EWS).
7. 1% of total seats shall be reserved for Children of Ex-servicemen.
8. 25% of seats, over and above the allotted number of seats, shall be reserved as supernumerary seats for the overseas candidates who are eligible for admission and are recommended by the Government of India under a Scholarship from the Government of India or under an exchange Programme (ICCR Programme). These seats shall be filled in

accordance with the UGC Guidelines. Out of the 15% supernumerary seats, one seat in each program will be reserved for Kashmiri Migrants (KM) as per the directives of the UGC.

9. 10% of seats, over and above the allotted number of seats, shall be reserved as supernumerary seats for the candidates of other Universities.

Notes:

For National Admission Programmes, the reservation percentage is as per Central Government Rules.

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REFUND OF FEES AS PER UGC GUIDELINES

If a student chooses to withdraw from the Programme of study in which s/he is enrolled, the following five-tier system shall be followed for the refund of fees remitted by her/him.

- c) The Seat Confirmation Fee is fully refundable in case of withdrawal of provisional admission within 30 days from the last date of admission.
- d) Admission Fees shall be fully refundable in case a candidate fails to qualify for the UG Examination within 60 days from the last date of admission.

1. BIOTECHNOLOGY DISCIPLINE**a) Introduction:**

Since its inception in 1988, the M.Sc. Marine Biotechnology Programme has been funded by the Department of Biotechnology (Ministry of Science and Technology, Govt. of India, New Delhi), placing Goa University in an enviable position among the top DBT centres for M.Sc. Biotechnology is on par with Universities such as Jawaharlal Nehru University, The Maharaja Sayajirao University (MSU) of Baroda, and Banaras Hindu University in terms of receiving continuous funding from the DBT for this M.Sc. Programme. Students taken in for the Programme are nationally selected through the GAT-B exam conducted by the National Testing Agency. Given its reputation and standard in producing world-class human resources in Biotechnology in India, the Discipline was among the few centres that have been identified for continued funding during the fifteen Finance Commissions. The alumni are well-placed, and the complete list is available on the Goa University website. The Marine Biotechnology discipline also conducts a 2-credit course on Scuba Diving. The students selected for the programme receive a stipend of Rs. 5,000/-p.m. for the duration of the Programme.

The Discipline is one of the pioneers in Marine Biotechnology teaching and research in the country, and in the year 2008, it had the added distinction of being DST-FIST sponsored.

The Discipline also conducts an M.Sc. Programme in Biotechnology to provide skilled manpower for the state of Goa. The students are selected through the GUART conducted by Goa University. The Discipline has excellent strengths that have been developed in the following thrust areas: Marine Viruses, the study of agarases, xylanases, lipases, cellulases, alginate lyases, amylases and proteases of special characteristics of commercial importance from marine microorganisms; biodiversity and ecology of hypersaline Actinomycetes and sulphate reducing bacteria; stress biology and bioprospecting of halophilic microorganisms, study of marine macroalgae for nutraceutical properties, isolation of lectins and biofuel, isolation of bioactive substances from plant extracts and marine sources; bioremediation of heavy metals by salt pan bacteria and their nanoparticles; Genomics and Proteomics of Marine bacteria; bioprospecting of marine macroalgae, marine macroalgae biorefinery, Bioremediation of heavy metals by marine macroalgae; recovery nutrients, Bioinformatics; Phytoplankton ecology, ecophysiology and applications; Bioimaging; nanomaterial and medicinal herbs for biomedical applications; Plant biology and epigenetics, Marine immunology, Aquaculture technology and Marine-derived pharmaceuticals.

b) Major facilities:

PCR facility, Gel documentation unit, UV- Vis Spectrophotometers, DNA/Protein Fluorometer, Walk-in-Cold Room facility, Cell disruption systems, Class II Biosafety Cabinet, Real-Time thermal cycler, Lyophilizer, Tissue Culture facility, Deep freezers (-20 and -80⁰ C), Fluorescence/Phase Contrast Microscope, Pilot-scale Fermenters, Ultrapure water system, Library, Bioinformatics Lab, Computer Lab for Bioinformatics, High-speed Refrigerated Centrifuges, Ultracentrifuges, AKTA Protein purification system, ELISA Reader Fluorescence activated cell sorter (FACs), Zebrafish Housing system.

c) Other highlights:

The M.Sc. Marine Biotechnology HRD programme is supported by the Discipline of Biotechnology, Ministry of Science and Technology, New Delhi.

After completing the M.Sc. programme, most students pursue their PhD in National/ International research institutes. Several students are selected for the Biotechnology Industrial Training Programme for on-the-job training. The students also find placement in pharmaceutical industries/R&D laboratories and are employed as project trainees in several national laboratories.

2. BOTANY DISCIPLINE**a) Introduction**

The Discipline offers Post-Graduate studies and research in Botany with thrust areas in Plant Diversity (Algae, Fungi, Bryophytes, Pteridophytes and Higher Plants), Plant Molecular Biology and Genetic Engineering, Plant Tissue Culture, Mycorrhizal Research, Plant Developmental Biology, Plant Histochemistry, Rice grain biology, Bio-prospecting of medicinal plants and Plant Physiology. Discipline has active R & D collaborations with industries on wine technology, mushroom cultivation, and categorical support from local industries and eco-resorts for hands-on training and internship for bio entrepreneurship and ecotourism courses, and for consultancy on re-vegetation of mine wastelands. Novel AM fungal species have been identified and published from the State of Goa. Besides, the discipline houses an AM fungal culture collection. Several new genera and species have been published through biodiversity studies, a family has been added to the Indian flora, substantial work on endemic plants of the Western Ghats, and group-specific taxonomic revisions have been carried out for higher plants.

Faculty members are part of several international, national, and State-level committees, reviewers of proposals and papers, and on the editorial boards of several journals.

b) Significant achievements of the discipline

a State and nationally award-winning faculty and research scholars.

b With more than 612 research publications.

- c Several Alumni are globally well-placed in respectable positions.
- d Acknowledged as an important centre for Plant Science and Biodiversity studies in the Western Ghats and Western India.
- e Excellent *ex-situ* reference collection of Western Ghats plant herbarium and in-house fungus cultures.
- f Substantial contributions to policy formulations at the State and National levels.
- g Leading discipline in the creation of ecological and environmental awareness.
- h Supported for seven years by the Planning Commission of India for documenting plant and fungal biodiversity of the Western Ghats.

c) Major facilities:

The Discipline is equipped with Student and Research microscopes with photographic facilities, a fluorescence microscope, SEM, HPLC, UV-VIS spectrophotometer, FTIR, Chloro-fluorometer, Lyophilizer, Rotary shakers, PCR, RT-PCR, Gel documentation system, Tissue culture laboratory, Laminar flow chambers, Digital and film cameras, Fungus culture collection centre, Herbarium, Polyhouses, Botanical Garden for teaching and research. The botany discipline also subscribes to front-line national and foreign Journals in Botany. An exclusive computer laboratory with printing and scanning facilities, computers in each laboratory and classroom, all networked and connected to the internet.

d) Other highlights:

Discipline was supported by DST- FIST twice and also supported by UGC SAP (DRS III)

Students of this Discipline are placed in various teaching institutes within Goa, National laboratories, Universities abroad, and Industries.

3. MICROBIOLOGY AND MARINE MICROBIOLOGY DISCIPLINE

a) Introduction:

The Discipline of Microbiology, Goa University, was started in 1974 under the Centre of Post-Graduate Instruction and Research, affiliated to the University of Bombay. It became a full-fledged Discipline of the then newly founded Goa University in 1985.

The Discipline was initiated with a Post-Graduate Programme in Microbiology. A second Master's Programme in Marine Microbiology was started in June 2012, having been awarded the Programme by the University Grants Commission, the Government of India, under the Innovative Programme for 'Teaching and Research in Interdisciplinary and Emerging Areas'. The Discipline introduced a Master's Programme in Biochemistry in June 2014.

The Discipline carries out research in thrust areas such as Microbial Genetics, Molecular Microbiology, Marine Microbiology, Microbial Ecology, Environmental Microbiology, Genetic

Engineering, Extremophilic Microorganisms, and Microbial Bio prospecting for enzymes, antimicrobial metabolites, and PHA, with the support of grants from UGC, DOD, ICMR, DST, MoEFCC, IGSTC, DBT, and TERI.

b) Major Facilities:

High Pressure Liquid Chromatography; Atomic Absorption Spectrophotometer; High speed and Cooling Centrifuges; Gel Electrophoretic units for protein/DNA, DGGE, Phase contrast and Compound Microscopes; Fluorescence and UV-Vis Spectrophotometer; Thermal Cycler; UV Trans illuminator; Millipore Ultra Filtration Unit; Water bath; Incubator shakers; Rheometer; Fermenter; Gel Documentation Systems; SDS-PAGE and IEF System; Nano drop spectrophotometer, PCR, Rotary Evaporator, Pellet making machine, Freezer (-20° C), Biosafety Cabinet; Anaerobic jars, Cold room.

c) Other highlights:

The funding agencies include: UGC, DOD, DST, DBT, MoEFCC, TERI, SERB, and Goa State Wetland Authority. The Discipline has received funding from DBT under the FIST Programme for strengthening of teaching and research in Microbiology. The Discipline was recognised by the MoEFCC as a Centre of Excellence in Marine Microbiology in 2007. UGC supported an Advanced PG Diploma in Marine Microbiology and Technology as well as an innovative M.Sc. Marine Microbiology Programme.

Students of M.Sc. Microbiology are placed in various research institutes (Disciplines of National/State Government, CSIR - National Institute of Oceanography, ICAR-CCARI - Indian Council of Agricultural Research – Central Coastal Agricultural Research Institute, National Centre for Polar and Ocean Research, **National Institute of Malaria research field unit Goa**, Birla Institute of Technology and Sciences, colleges, food/pharmaceutical and aquaculture industries, diagnostic laboratories, Assistant professor jobs in Universities and colleges, State Government bodies (FDA, Fisheries Department, and Forensics) etc.

4. ZOOLOGY DISCIPLINE

a) Introduction:

The Discipline offers a Master's Programme in Zoology with the intent to develop an aptitude for learning about Zoology and the significance of fauna ranging from single-cell to multicellular systems. Keeping in mind the Discipline thrust area “**Life processes, Aquaculture and Biodiversity**”, the current Post-Graduation curriculum has been restructured. The new **M.Sc. Zoology** curriculum strikes a precise balance between the classical courses and modern biological courses and has been made to introduce and emphasise the skill-based Programmes along with an Internship. Apart from the standard topics on Animal Sciences, namely, Taxonomy and

Systematics, Biodiversity, and Anatomy of Non-chordates and Chordates, this syllabus also covers topics on various aspects of Life Processes such as Animal Physiology, Endocrinology, Developmental Biology, and Molecular Biology. The restructured M.Sc. Zoology Programme also focuses on various application-based or skill-based courses such as Fishery Sciences and Fish Farm Management, Food Processing, Environmental Physiology, Neurophysiology, Stem Cell Biology, Herpetology, Wildlife Biology, and Ethology. Courses like Immunology, Cell Biology, Animal Genetics, Biological Techniques, Biostatistics, and Vector Biology also represent this restructured syllabus. This Programme, through the dissertation, will also help the students understand the basic principles of nature and provide scope for hands-on experience to experiment with nature /animals, enabling them to develop an aptitude for research in various allied fields of animal sciences. This curriculum will also allow them to overcome several day-to-day problems faced by our society by providing them with some practical and effective solutions.

Faculty members are engaged in research on Nano-toxicology, Neurophysiology, Animal Physiology, Animal Cell Culture, Ornithology, Herpetology, Biodiversity, Ethology and Ecology, Conservation Biology, Animal Biotechnology, Molecular Biology, Environmental Physiology, Toxicology, Genotoxicology, Fishery Science and Aquaculture. The PhD. in Zoology Programme offered is oriented towards the research specialisations of faculty members.

CLINICAL GENETICS & MEDICAL LABORATORY TECHNIQUES DISCIPLINE

a) Introduction:

The Post-Graduate Diploma in Clinical Genetics and Medical Laboratory Techniques (PGDCG and MLT) is a multidisciplinary Programme designed to provide comprehensive training in both theoretical and practical aspects of human genetics and laboratory diagnostics. The Programme aims to bridge the gap between core biological sciences and modern clinical applications, equipping Graduates with the knowledge and technical skills essential for roles in clinical laboratories, research institutions, diagnostics, and healthcare facilities. This one-year diploma Programme is collaboratively offered by Goa University and Goa Medical College, integrating faculty expertise from Zoology, Biochemistry, Microbiology, and Pathology departments. It follows an outcome-based educational framework aligned with the UGC's Curriculum and Credit Framework for Post-Graduate Programmes (CCFPP2023) under Ordinance OA-35A. Learners are trained through advanced modules covering clinical genetics, biochemistry, microbiology, pathology, parasitology, virology, haematology, and transfusion medicine. Special focus is on laboratory management, biomedical safety, diagnostic instrumentation, and quality assurance. Upon completing coursework (40 credits), students undertake a compulsory 6-month internship in the Government hospital laboratories to gain real-world, hands-on experience.

Eligibility for the PGDCGMLT programme is a Bachelor of Science Degree with a major or minor in Zoology / Microbiology / Biotechnology / Biochemistry / Life Science / Bioscience / Nursing / Allied Health Sciences, OR a Degree in BAMS / BHMS / MBBS / BDS.

b) Major facilities:

I. Laboratories:

The laboratories are designed to make it convenient for the students to work comfortably in the different research areas. The M.Sc. and PGCGDMLT laboratories facilitate the students to carry out their practical courses and dissertation work. The students get hands-on experience while working with instruments in the laboratory. The students perform different experiments in various subjects as per the scheduled curriculum for developing research interest and skills. The various laboratories are M.Sc. Laboratory, PGCGDMLT Laboratory, Research Laboratory, Instrumentation Room, Optical Instrumentation Laboratory, and Animal Tissue Culture Laboratory, which cater to the research needs of students of the discipline.

The Research laboratory is also designed to promote an encouraging research environment and atmosphere for the PhD. as well as Post-Doc Fellows to carry out their research work without any distraction or disturbance, and to promote research discussion. The Instrumentation and optical instrumentation laboratories are well established with sophisticated equipment to carry out the research activity for the researchers as well as the faculty.

The Animal Tissue Culture Laboratory is designed in a way that facilitates research in invertebrate and vertebrate cell culture, such as stem cells, neuronal cells, gill cells, mantle cells, siphon cells, macrophages, haemocytes, etc. The establishment of primary cell cultures, cell lines, their characterisation as well as the development of cryopreservation methods are the outputs of this laboratory facility.

Instruments: The major instruments available in the Discipline are Spectrofluorophotometer, UV-Visible Spectrophotometer, Microplate reader, Osmometer, RT-PCR, PCR, Ultracentrifuge, Cooling Centrifuge, Osmometer, Nanodrop spectrophotometer, Fluorescence Microscopes, Inverted Microscopes, Stereomicroscope, GC-MS, HPLC, and Gel Doc system.

II. Museum Facility:

The museum maintains a wide variety of specimen collections belonging to different invertebrate and vertebrate phyla. The animal specimens from the museum are used by the students for detailed taxonomic studies. Major specimen collections in the museum incorporate representations of almost all phyla. Few Microscopic organisms, along with various cytological and histological collections of permanent slides, are also maintained and utilised as and when required for teaching, learning, and research purposes. Specimens deposited by any persons

from the roadkill are also entered in the museum collection for their storage upon verification. Besides this, we also have a good collection of skeletal structures and anatomical models of various vertebrates. A substantial collection of entomological specimens of Butterflies and Insects through dry preservation techniques is also a special attraction of our museum. Most of these collections represent the specimens that were collected by our own M.Sc. students during their teaching/learning process, and to promote research in the area of biodiversity and entomology. We do have a workbench to do the needful display as and when one wants to refer to our museum collection.

Computer laboratory:

The computer laboratory is designed in a way to provide facilities for M Sc. and PhD. students for referencing. Goa University has access to some paid journals and sites, allowing students to take full advantage of them by accessing them. Students can also prepare their assignments and take the printouts whenever needed. This facility is also extended for their dissertation manuscript typing.

III. Animal House facility:

An animal house facility is available to be utilised for meeting the teaching and research demands involving animal experimentation.

The Animal House Facility is registered with the Committee for Control and Supervision of Experiments on Animals (**CCSEA**), Ministry of Environment and Forests, Govt. of India (Reg. No: 2014/GO/Re/S/20/CCSEA) and has an established Institutional Animal Ethics Committee (IAEC) that advises the students, teachers/researchers on facilities, policies and practices concerning the care and use of animals. All the experiments involving animals are approved by the IAEC, which is constituted by CCSEA. The IAEC meetings are held regularly to obtain ethical clearance for the use of animals in academics and research. The facility maintains all relevant records to ensure compliance with the approvals granted by the committee, and progress under each approved protocol is put up for review by IAEC regularly in each meeting. Structural Facility consists of a Quarantine Room, Mice/Rat Study Facility, Herpetofauna Facility, Aquaria rooms, Preparation room, Store area, washing area, large tanks for maintaining fish and an Experimental laboratory. A visiting qualified veterinarian and regular caretaker staff are always at hand to monitor and maintain the animals that are brought to this facility to carry out research and keep it in accordance with the standards established by the Committee for the Purpose of Control and Supervision of Experiments on Animals (CCSEA). The CCSEA has approved this facility for small animal Research for Education and research purposes. This Animal House facility is extended for PG students and faculty of various disciplines in Goa University and the facility also intends to extend its support to various Under Graduate colleges affiliated to Goa University. The animal

house facility was established at the Zoology Discipline of Goa University with the sole aim of promoting laboratory animal research. Here, students will also learn the ethical treatment of animals.

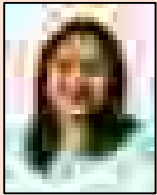
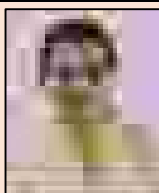

1. ECONOMICS DISCIPLINE

The M.A. Programme in Economics is of two years (four semesters) during which students have to earn 80 credits as per the University rules to complete the Degree requirements. It blends modern and conventional areas of Economics with an emphasis on quantitative techniques. Students have the option of earning all credits through in-class courses or partial research and online courses. The core teaching includes microeconomics, macroeconomics, statistics, mathematical economics, econometrics, public economics, international economics, and development economics.

The M.A. Economics Programme aims to provide a strong theoretical overview of the subject domain with an emphasis on quantitative techniques. In order to give a flavour of different areas of economic studies, students are offered a wide range of elective courses including Econometrics, Environmental Economics, Financial Economics and Human Resource Development, Labour Economics, Regional Integration, Indian Economic Thought and the Goan Economy. The Programme is designed to empower students to join the academic world of teaching and research, the financial and banking sector, or the administrative apparatus.

2. MANAGEMENT STUDIES DISCIPLINE

Master of Business Administration is a two-year Post-Graduate program leading to the MBA Degree in the areas of Marketing, Finance, Human Resources, Operations, or Business Analytics. It prepares students for a career in management and generates and disseminates knowledge in

management through research and consultancy. It also sensitises students to the importance of sustainable and ethical decision-making.

The Master of Business Administration (Executive) programme provides an opportunity for continued education for people with work experience. Designed as a weekday programme, classes will be scheduled from 6.30 pm to 9.00 pm every Monday to Friday. MBA (Executive) programme is offered by Goa Business School to enable participants to get the essential skills to succeed in corporate life. It is designed to facilitate learning through interaction with different stakeholders, using participant-centred learning tools inclusive of Case studies, role plays, simulations and a range of activities. Course Management software is used extensively to share resources, for assessment, for feedback, etc. Opportunities are provided to learn through live projects in different courses, and experienced faculty are provided to facilitate the process. MBA (Executive) Programme is divided into 4 Semesters over 2 years. Academic Courses are planned in Semesters 1 to 3, and the last Semester is designed for the industry project (that can be done in the organisation where the participant is currently employed), and faculty mentors will be allocated to each student participant to work with them. Each Credit Hour equals 15 in-class contact hours. A healthy mix of Core Courses and Elective Courses (Vocational Electives, Generic Electives) is designed for the Programme. A rich component of electives (more than 50% of total credits) is included, giving an opportunity for participants to choose a variety of Electives that may be offered across General Management (including Marketing, Finance, Human Resources). However, certain minimum registrations are required for an Elective to be offered in the programme (Registrations will be taken at the end of the second semester).

3. HOSPITALITY AND TOURISM DISCIPLINE

The M.B.A. (Integrated) in (Hospitality and Tourism) programme at Goa University is a five-year comprehensive programme designed to develop managerial and entrepreneurial competencies in the dynamic sectors of hospitality, tourism, and management. Structured in line with industry demands, it emphasises experiential learning through field visits, internships, practical work, and projects, equipping students with both theoretical acumen and real-world skills essential for leadership roles in the global tourism sector.

This programme develops and imparts expertise in the field of Hospitality and Tourism by imparting knowledge in the domain of International Hospitality. It inculcates the skills and expertise required in the field of various cuisines around the world, hospitality and imparts management skills and practices, with a special focus on Domestic and International tourism. It also inculcates and develops entrepreneurial skills in the field of hospitality and tourism. It imparts various skills required for the sustainable development of the economy and society. This

programme also helps generate the development of new tourism products and destinations and imparts managerial skills for efficiently channelizing the resources for tourism destination development and management.

4. FINANCIAL SERVICES DISCIPLINE

The M.B.A. (Financial Services) Programme at Goa University is a two-year programme specially designed to equip students with in-depth knowledge of financial services segments, including banking, capital markets, insurance, and financial technology. It blends theoretical rigour with practical exposure, preparing Graduates for dynamic careers in India's evolving financial services sector.

This programme develops a comprehensive understanding of financial principles, instruments, markets and institutions relevant to banking and financial services. It equips students with analytical and decision-making skills required for managing financial services in a dynamic economic environment and fosters technological and regulatory competence to adapt to evolving financial innovations and compliance frameworks. It also prepares Graduates for managerial roles through experiential learning, industry engagement, and ethical financial management practices.

5. COMPUTER SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY DISCIPLINE

The Master of Computer Applications (MCA) is a two-year Post-Graduate Degree programme that focuses on providing students with advanced knowledge and skills in computer applications, preparing them for careers in software development, IT management, and emerging technologies.

This programme develops professionals who are employable in the software industry, corporate sector, academia, entrepreneurial pursuits and other IT services based on the AICTE and NEP guidelines.

The M.Sc. in Artificial Intelligence is a two-year Post-Graduate programme designed to provide in-depth expertise in core AI areas such as machine learning, deep learning, natural language processing, computer vision, and data science. The curriculum blends theoretical foundations with hands-on lab work, covering both foundational and advanced topics like generative AI, agentic AI, and AI engineering. It also includes interdisciplinary applications, ethical considerations, and industry-relevant skills through electives, research components, and internships. The programme prepares Graduates for roles such as AI engineers, data scientists, machine learning researchers, and innovators in AI-driven domains.

M.Sc. in AI programme provides in-depth knowledge of Machine Learning, Deep Learning, and Data Science while offering hands-on experience in building and deploying AI solutions. It emphasises ethical AI practices, problem-solving, and interdisciplinary applications in industries like healthcare and finance. The programme prepares students for careers as AI Engineers, Data Scientists, and Machine Learning Researchers while fostering innovation through research and industry collaboration.

The M.Sc. Data Science programme is a two-year Post-Graduate programme designed for under Graduates in Computer Science, IT, Data Science, Artificial Intelligence, related Science disciplines, and Engineering streams. It provides a strong foundation in statistics, mathematics, and computer science, equipping students with practical skills in data analysis, machine learning, big data technologies, and data-driven decision-making. The programme emphasises interdisciplinary learning, hands-on experience with modern tools, and the development of critical thinking, ethical awareness, and analytical reasoning. Graduates will be prepared for careers in industry, research, or academia, with the capacity to drive innovation, entrepreneurship, and research-led solutions in the data science domain. This programme provides a strong understanding of core concepts in statistics, mathematics, and computer science that serve as a foundation for data science practices. It trains students with practical skills in using modern tools, programming environments, and big data technologies for the end-to-end lifecycle of data, from collection and processing to analysis, interpretation, and visualisation in real-world applications, and cultivates critical thinking and analytical reasoning necessary for designing data-driven solutions to diverse real-world challenges. It also promotes a research-oriented mindset through systematic problem formulation, experimental design, and analytical evaluation.

The M.Sc. (Integrated) in Data Science is a comprehensive five-year Post-Graduate programme that includes an exit option after the third year. It offers a solid grounding in core areas such as Mathematics, Statistics, and Computer Science through an interdisciplinary curriculum. The programme also emphasises hands-on experience in data analysis, machine learning, big data tools, and data-informed decision-making.

GBS also gives students the chance of practical on-the-job training by way of Internships, Projects, Consultancies, etc.

6. COMMERCE DISCIPLINE

The two-year Master of Commerce course has the objective of providing extensive specialised knowledge in different domains of Commerce and Business for inculcating appropriate skills and ethical values among the students. More specifically, the course aims at developing the human potential to serve the various fields of the teaching profession and also to serve research in the social sciences, thereby helping meet the needs of industry at micro and macro levels. It is designed for students who wish to build a strong foundation in business and commerce and seek higher-level knowledge in professional managerial practices.

This programme provides in-depth knowledge of key areas in commerce such as accounting, finance, taxation, marketing, management, and business practices and prepares students for academic, research, and professional careers in the corporate and public sectors. It develops analytical, decision-making, and problem-solving skills in business contexts and provides necessary training to become successful growth agents responsible for positive socio-economic transformation.

7. LIBRARY AND INFORMATION SCIENCE DISCIPLINE

The Master of Library and Information Science (MLISc.) is a two-year Post-Graduate Degree programme to prepare students for leadership roles in libraries, information centres, archives, and

digital environments. The Programme is built upon the foundations of library science. It emphasises traditional library science principles, modern information management practices, technology integration, and research skills, enabling Graduates to manage, organize, and disseminate information effectively in a dynamic and digital world.

The Bachelor of Library and Information Science (LISc.) programme prepares professionals who can effectively manage, organise, and disseminate information in various settings such as libraries, archives, information centres, and digital environments. It provides theoretical knowledge and practical skills in librarianship, information science, and knowledge management and trains professionals in organising, accessing, and preserving information in various formats. It integrates information and communication technologies (ICTs) into library operations and services and also promotes research, innovation, and lifelong learning in LIS.

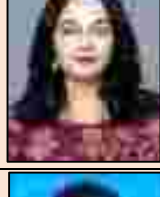

1. CHEMISTRY DISCIPLINE

a) Introduction

The school offers a two-year M.Sc. (80 credits) programme in Organic, Physical, Inorganic, and Analytical Chemistry, which includes a choice of dissertation. The research work leading to a PhD. A Degree in the above subjects encompasses various domains of chemical research with emphasis on synthesis of natural products, development of reagents for organic synthesis, synthesis and application of polymers and nanocomposites, synthesis of pure and mixed metal oxide nanoparticles and quantum dots, and study of their solid-state properties as well as applications such as gas sensors, super capacitors, antibacterial agents, and catalysts. The research extends further into computational and theoretical chemistry, bioinorganic, biomimetic and bioinspired chemistry, structural chemistry, homogeneous catalysis,

coordination polymers and metal organic frameworks, design of heme and non-heme ligands, development of catalysts/ electrocatalysts and their use in kinetics evaluation for various fundamental processes related to energy and environment.

b) Major facilities:

Instrumental Facilities: NMR spectrophotometer (400 MHz), BRUKER AXS D8 QUEST ECO Single Crystal XRD, Liquid Chromatography Mass Spectrometer (LC-MS), Atomic Force Microscope (AFM), Vibrating Sample Magnetometer (VSM), Automated Gas Sorption Analyzer (BET), Thermal Analyzers (TG/DTA/DSC), Electrochemical Workstation, Gel permeation chromatograph, Infra-Red spectrophotometer, UV-Visible spectrophotometer, Raman and Photo-Luminescence (PL) Spectrometers, Cryostat for UV-Visible studies, Microwave digester, Atomic Emission Spectrometer (AES), CHNS Analyzer, High-performance liquid chromatograph (HPLC), Flash chromatograph, Gas Chromatograph (GC), Ball Mill, LCQR meter, Keithley Electrometers, Automated high temperature A.C. Susceptibility and Resistivity set ups, Laminar air flow, Thermal cycler, Bacteriological incubator, Cooling centrifuge, etc.

c) Other highlights:

School of Chemical Sciences: Formerly the Discipline of Chemistry, it is supported by DST-FIST and UGC-SAP (DSA – I) programmes. School of Chemical Science faculty has funded projects from the Department of Science and Technology (DST), Council of Scientific and Industrial Research (CSIR), University Grants Commission (UGC), Anusandhan National Research Foundation (ANRF), Department of Biotechnology (DBT), Goa State Research Foundation (GSRF), Ministry of Mines, Department of Science, Technology and Environment (DSTE, Goa), etc. The School of Chemical Sciences is also part of the multidisciplinary DST-PURSE programme.

Students, after completing their M.Sc. in Chemistry/Biochemistry, are absorbed in different types of Industries such as the mining industry, the pharmaceutical/chemical industry, including the ones having an R&D programme, academic institutions, and the Government jobs in Departments such as the FDA, GSPCB, Forensic Science Lab, Hospitals, Path labs, etc. Students also join for higher studies (PhD.) or professional courses (B.Ed.) after completion of M.Sc. The PhD. Degree holders find positions in Industries as Managers and in R&D as research scientists, in academic institutions as assistant professors. Professors, and in foreign Universities as Post-Doctoral Fellows.

School of Chemical Sciences (SCS) has a vibrant Alumni Association formed in February 2006 with the name “Chemistry Department Faculty and Alumni Association (CDFAA)” which is involved in conducting various Programmes in association with the School of Chemical Sciences, Goa University. One of its flagship programmes is to help financially “Economically Backwards Needy Meritorious Students” pursuing their post-graduation in Chemistry/Biochemistry at the School of Chemical Sciences, Goa University, by providing a fellowship of Rs. 1500/- per month. Besides

this, CDFAA pays tuition and exam fees as well as hostel/mess charges of extremely poor meritorious students of SCS. CDFAA also provides financial help of Rs. 2000/- per month to those SCS students who find it difficult to complete their education due to the death of an earning member of their family during their post-graduation at SCS. CDFAA organises annually a reunion of M.Sc. students who have completed 25 years after their post-graduation at the erstwhile Dept. of Chemistry, along with their teachers who taught them. It also annually organises an intercollegiate research project competition since 2007, on the topic 'Fascinating world of chemical sciences'. CDFAA also initiated the organisation of a symposium, entitled 'Chem Scholar's Connect' from 2026 onwards, aimed at providing a platform for PhD scholars to present and discuss their research work. To encourage research activity in Chemistry, it awards the best researcher prize every year (Rs.5000/Rs.3000) to the University and College teachers for their excellent performance in research (in Chemistry) during that year. CDFAA felicitates our alumni who clear the NET-JRF examination during its annual GB meet.

SCS organizes state/national/international level symposiums, conferences, workshops /meetings in collaboration with CDFAA. SCS faculty has National and International collaborations in research activities

2. BIOCHEMISTRY DISCIPLINE

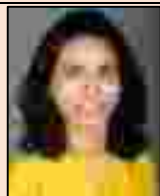
a) Introduction:

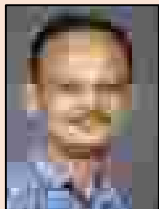
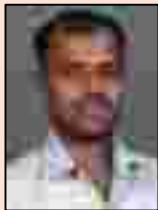
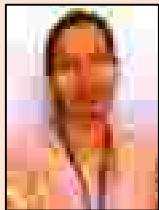

1. HISTORY DISCIPLINE

a) Introduction

The Discipline of History provides students with a comprehensive understanding of both theory and practice, contextualised within local, national, and global frameworks. Maritime history and

Indo-Portuguese history are the thrust areas, while also offering courses in ancient, medieval, and modern Indian history, as well as histories of Goa, Europe, Africa, West Asia, and South Asia. This comprehensive curriculum equips students with a strong academic foundation and prepares them for roles in teaching, academia, public administration, journalism, and any path they choose to pursue. Prominent course themes include maritime history, Portuguese colonialism, history of Goa, Indian history across periods, urbanisation, oral history, museology, environmental history, doing history, historiography, research methods, tourism studies, the history of ordinary lives, the Marathas, archaeology, numismatics, epigraphy, museology, colonialism, and nationalism. In addition to classroom instruction, students participate in field trips to the Goa Archives, museums, and significant natural sites in Goa. The Programme organises annual seminars to encourage research scholars and Post-Graduate students to engage in academic discourse and broaden their exposure to recent scholarship. Visiting scholars and professors are also invited to deliver lectures.

b) Major Facilities

Students enrolled in the History programme have access to an extensive collection of books and journals at the Goa University Library. The library houses the Pissurlencar and Nuno Gonsalves collections, which provide valuable primary and secondary sources for academic research.

The programme offers a dedicated computer laboratory with Internet access, maintained by the Computer Centre of Goa University. In addition, students have access to the University's common computer facilities. Classrooms in the programme are equipped with LCD projectors, LED television sets, and Cybernetyx AI Digital Boards, enabling faculty and students to access audio and video resources from web-based platforms such as Vyas, YouTube, and Swayam. Furthermore, classrooms are supported by an uninterrupted power supply through inverters and are fully air-conditioned.

2. POLITICAL DISCIPLINE

a) Introduction:

The Political Science Programme seeks to empower students with the knowledge of both the theory and practices of politics by relating it to the local, national and global landscape over the two-year Master's Programme. It seeks to constantly innovate teaching and learning methodologies to equip the students for a better future career. The Programme has made significant contributions in the areas of Decentralized Governance, South Asia, Democratic Politics and Goa's Politics. The teaching program and curriculum are regularly updated and reflect the core competencies of the faculty members.

b) Major Facilities:

The Programme has a Resource Room consisting of periodicals and books donated by the alumni and faculty members. It also has well-equipped classrooms with audio-video and ICT facilities for conducting classes, small workshops, and meetings.

c) Other highlights:

Collaborations with affiliated colleges, media outlets, the Government Departments and Non-Governmental Organisations, the Office of the Governor of Goa and Chancellor of Goa University, Chief Electoral Officer, Goa, and Goa Institute of Public Administration and Rural Development.

3. SOCIOLOGY DISCIPLINE

a) Introduction:

The teaching Programme in Sociology blends classical foundations with contemporary developments and debates. Substantively, moving beyond its disciplinary confines, the Programme seeks to promote teaching and research on contemporary Goa. At the Master's level, the Programme promotes fieldwork-based assignments and dissertations. Towards this end, it holds an annual Research Methodology Training camp. Students are encouraged to participate and present papers at conferences and seminars.

4. WOMEN'S STUDIES DISCIPLINE

a) Introduction:

The Centre for Women's Studies (CWS) at Goa University was established in 1988 as a UGC Centre and has been actively involved in teaching, research, and extension activities since 1992. Initially established to promote gender studies and address women's issues, the centre has played a key role in advancing knowledge and awareness of gender equality, women's rights, and empowerment. In line with UGC guidelines, the Centre for Women's Studies was transformed into a Department of Women's Studies at Goa University, further formalizing its contributions to education and social change. In 2013, the University introduced a PhD programme in Women's Studies, which provided an opportunity for in-depth research in the field. This was followed by the launch of the MA Women's Studies Programme in 2015, which is aligned with the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020. The MA programme aims to equip students with theoretical and practical knowledge to address gender issues from a multidisciplinary perspective, and it continues to evolve to meet the changing needs of society.

b) Major Features:

The Women's Studies (WS) Programme at Goa University is a pioneering initiative in the state, offering the only such programme in the region. The Women's Studies programme is designed to foster critical thinking, generate new knowledge, and nurture a strong commitment to social transformation. The discipline adopts innovative and inclusive approaches to knowledge

production, with a focus on bridging theory and practice. One of the programme's distinctive features is its emphasis on life skills, which are integrated into the curriculum. These skills include critical thinking, empathy, decision-making, and resilience, all of which are vital for personal and professional development. Moreover, the programme offers fieldwork placements and internships, providing students with hands-on experience in various sectors, including NGOs and corporate social responsibility (CSR) projects.

The Women's Studies Programme uses a participatory, learner-centric, and applied pedagogy, making learning both interactive and practical. The programmes aim to build students' research capacities, enabling them to engage both academically and practically with contemporary social realities. The pedagogy integrates classroom learning with extension activities, hands-on training, research, documentation, advocacy, and field-based action within diverse community settings. Students are encouraged to engage with real-world issues through collaborative initiatives and experiential learning. In addition to academics, the programme actively engages in social initiatives. Every year, students go on a field trip to disadvantaged communities, gaining first-hand experience and empathy for marginalised groups. The programme also holds an annual Film Appreciation Festival and Reading Clubs, which foster critical discussions on gender and social issues.

The discipline actively networks with organisations committed to social empowerment at state, national, and international levels. It works closely with multiple stakeholders—including Government agencies and civil society organisations—on advocacy, research, and outreach initiatives. Graduates of Women's Studies are equipped with interdisciplinary knowledge and practical skills, enabling them to contribute effectively to organisations working in areas such as gender justice, human rights, media, environment, and development.

c) Other Highlights

- Strong engagement with the Government departments, including Women and Child Development and related sectors
- Active participation in the Government outreach and community-based projects
- Collaboration with non-Governmental organisations (NGOs) and civil society groups
- Academic linkages with colleges and schools for awareness and training programmes
- Opportunities in research, documentation, and policy advocacy
- Exposure to Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) initiatives
- Career pathways in media, development sectors, and social research organisations

5. SOCIAL WORK DISCIPLINE

a) Introduction

The Social Work discipline at D. D. Kosambi School of Social Sciences and Behavioural Studies offers a two-year Post-Graduate programme of Master of Social Work (MSW) and a PhD. in Social Work. Master of Social Work (MSW) programme at Goa University is designed to prepare students for professional practice across diverse social contexts. The programme integrates rigorous academic learning with structured field engagement, enabling students to work effectively with individuals, families, groups, and communities. It is grounded in the core values of social justice, human dignity, and human rights, and encourages critical engagement with issues such as inequality, marginalisation, and development. Through an interdisciplinary curriculum, students develop conceptual clarity, analytical skills, and a strong ethical foundation for practice.

b) Key features

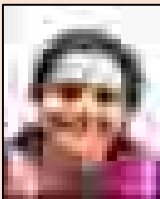

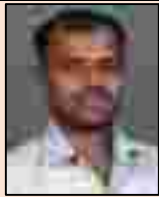
c) Other features

1. APPLIED GEOLOGY DISCIPLINE

The M.Sc. Applied Geology programme involves advanced training in subjects and builds upon the foundation laid at the Bachelor's level. The focus is on building a strong theoretical and practical framework to enable students to tackle routine work in the industry as well as to take initiative in challenging new areas. Accordingly, the Master's programme includes fundamental courses such as Mineralogy, Geochemistry, Structural Geology, Sedimentology, Igneous Petrology, Metamorphic Petrology, Economic Geology, Stratigraphy and Indian Geology, as well as courses related to practical aspects such as Remote Sensing, GIS, Petroleum Geology, Mining Geology, Groundwater Geology, Exploration Geophysics, and Statistical Geology. The coursework is aided by an introduction to computer applications in various fields. Some of the computer tools that the students are introduced to during the period of their coursework include Surfer, Strater, Rockware, Surpac, ArcGIS, IDIRSI, SteroNett, ERDAS, etc., apart from other software not explicitly related to the core subjects. As a supplement to the various theoretical courses, the students are also given an opportunity to work in the field. There are two educational field-related courses in the 2nd and 4th semesters, respectively, apart from the practical industry training in mining or petroleum-related industries at the end of the 2nd semester. The majority of the students over the years have been placed in mining and oil companies through regular counselling and campus placements. All the core and elective, optional courses included in the programmes have been specifically designed to meet industry standards and research requirements. The close links that this programme enjoys with the industry (particularly Mining and Mineral) and research organisations have worked towards elevating the level and quality of studies and facilities. The programme also works towards reaching the general public under outreach programmes for creating awareness in the conservation and management of natural resources. The Discipline has been actively involved in several international programmes (UNIGIS Distance Learning in GIS, International Earth Science Olympiad, etc.) Research opportunities (PhD.) for advanced study are offered under the Earth Science Programme, which has resulted in good publications in top-notch journals and has given good visibility to the programme of the school. The Geology Museum hosts representative samples covering most of the Peninsular India lithotypes as well as minerals, ores, and fossils.

2. MARINE SCIENCES DISCIPLINE

The Discipline of Marine Sciences, Goa University, was established in the year 1985 and has grown to become a multidisciplinary School focusing on Post-Graduate teaching and research in different branches of Marine Sciences, namely Physical Oceanography, Marine Chemistry, Marine Biology, and Marine Geology. Marine Sciences programme admits students from a wide background of bachelor's Degrees, such as Mathematics, Physics, Electronics, Computer Science, IT, Chemistry,

Industrial Chemistry, Analytical Chemistry, Pharmaceutical Chemistry, Zoology, Botany, Microbiology, Biotechnology, Biosciences, Fisheries, Aquatic Science, Earth Sciences, and Geology. The Marine Sciences programme is nationally recognised as a National Resource Centre in Marine Sciences. Since 2010, the programme has offered the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS), giving an option to the students to choose her/his optional courses. On-board ship training for a period of 15 to 20 days is a compulsory component of the course. This is in addition to the regular field surveys of the coastal zone and estuarine waters.

3. MARINE MICROBIOLOGY DISCIPLINE

This Programme was initiated in June 2012, under the award of UGC sponsored 'Innovative Programme for teaching and research in interdisciplinary and emerging areas'. The Program is meant for students to pursue higher studies in Marine Microbiology. Being a University in the coastal state of India, Goa University provides a strategic advantage in learning Microbiology of marine and coastal ecosystems. It serves to impart advanced training to students in the field of Marine Microbiology with a focus on marine microbial diversity, bio-prospecting, and applications of marine microbes in the production of various biologically significant metabolites and in bioremediation of polluted environments. Students undergo hands-on training with state-of-the-art technologies and are trained to develop an aptitude for independent research. The Programme equips students for higher research leading to the PhD. Degree in India or in International Universities overseas, or for employment in Research Institutes, in teaching, and in Industry, students find speedy employment.

4. ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCE DISCIPLINE

Environmental science has conventionally studied physical, chemical, and biological processes in the Earth system (Lithosphere, hydrosphere, atmosphere, and cryosphere). It now incorporates natural human interactions and the social, political, and cultural processes that impact the planet. The anthropogenic pressures on the ecological processes have forced disciplinary boundaries to merge, and a student of environmental science must understand the complex relationships that drive nature-human interactions. Sustainability is one of the grand challenges that human survival faces on planet Earth. This programme was initiated from AY 2021-22 and has been conceived as a multidisciplinary programme which will teach students how to combine skills and knowledge from a variety of domains. It will allow students to explore courses from a large number of disciplines and skill themselves in a manner that they feel best suits them for their knowledge pursuits. The programme will provide a holistic approach to understanding environmental issues and undertake environmental impact assessments with diverse perspectives, frameworks, and

using multiple data sources. All students will undertake fieldwork and laboratory work to experience different habitats, climates, land formations, and social structures.

5. REMOTE SENSING AND GEOGRAPHICAL INFORMATION SYSTEM DISCIPLINE

a) Introduction:

The Remote Sensing and Geographic Information Systems (RSandGIS) programme at SEOAS is aligned with the National Education Policy 2020, emphasising multidisciplinary learning, outcome-based education, and the integration of teaching, research, and skill development. Recently established, the programme serves as a core component of Earth System Science education at Goa University, addressing contemporary environmental and geospatial challenges through a balanced academic and applied framework.

The curriculum is structured to ensure attainment of clearly defined learning outcomes, combining strong theoretical foundations in remote sensing (sensor physics, radiative transfer, spectral analysis) and GIS (spatial data structures, geostatistics, and spatial modelling) with experiential learning. Students receive hands-on training in processing and analysing satellite data from platforms such as IRS, Sentinel, Landsat, and MODIS, supported by field-based observations and laboratory measurements.

A key strength of the programme lies in its research-oriented approach, particularly in coastal and estuarine systems, ocean colour remote sensing, atmospheric and aerosol studies, and hydrological and environmental modelling. The programme actively promotes integration of satellite data with in-situ measurements to enable scientifically robust, evidence-based analysis, aligned with national priorities in environmental monitoring, disaster risk reduction, and sustainable resource management.

The programme emphasises skill enhancement, critical thinking, and problem-solving through training in Python/MATLAB, as well as advanced geospatial platforms such as QGIS/SNAP/ENVI/ArcGIS/ERDAS Imagine/GRASS GIS, and Google Earth Engine. Through fieldwork in coastal and estuarine environments, the programme provides hands-on exposure to marine data acquisition and field methodologies. Emerging areas such as geospatial analytics, data-driven modelling, and digital Earth system frameworks are progressively integrated into teaching and research.

The programme maintains strong linkages with national research organisations, the Government agencies, and industry partners, facilitating internships, collaborative projects, and career pathways

in space applications, environmental consultancy, marine and atmospheric sciences, and geospatial technology sectors. Graduates are thus equipped to pursue higher research, contribute to interdisciplinary scientific programmes, and engage effectively with industry and policy frameworks. Through its outcome-based, research-integrated, and application-driven approach, the RSandGIS programme positions itself as a flagship academic initiative, fostering academic excellence, innovation, and societal relevance in alignment with national and global sustainability goals.

b) Major Facilities:

The programme is supported by a well-equipped computer laboratory with dedicated systems, networked with University servers, providing a robust platform for geospatial analysis, satellite data processing, algorithm development, and data-driven research. These facilities ensure adequate ICT-enabled learning resources, facilitate advanced research workflows, and strengthen the overall academic and research ecosystem of the programme.

The programme also provides hands-on training in specialised ocean optics and water-quality instruments, including Satlantic radiometers, a WetSTAR CDOM fluorometer, water sampling units, a multi-angle backscattering meter, Conductivity-Temperature-Depth, and a LISST particle size analyser. Laboratory and analytical systems comprise UV-Vis spectrophotometers, centrifuges, and incubators, supporting detailed environmental and biogeochemical analyses. Field and observational capabilities are further enhanced by using GPS units and hypsometers for geospatial and elevation measurements. In addition, atmospheric observation systems such as sunphotometers, aethalometers, automatic weather stations, and meteorological towers strengthen the programme's capability in atmospheric and climate-related studies.

6. ATMOSPHERIC SCIENCE DISCIPLINE

a) Introduction:

The M.Sc. Atmospheric Science is a specialised Post-Graduate programme offered by SEOAS, centred on a Physics-based understanding of atmospheric processes, with a focus on the dynamics, thermodynamics, and circulation systems that govern weather and climate. The curriculum is designed to develop a strong analytical foundation in atmospheric dynamics, boundary layer processes, cloud physics, and climate systems, with particular emphasis on monsoon variability, extreme weather events, and air-sea interaction mechanisms. The curriculum prioritises process understanding, quantitative modelling, and predictive capability, enabling students to interpret and simulate atmospheric behaviour across scales.

Goa's coastal environment provides a unique setting for studying coupled ocean-atmosphere processes, enabling students to conduct field-based observations of monsoon evolution, coastal meteorology, and climate variability. The programme is closely linked with ongoing research

supported by agencies such as the Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO), providing exposure to real-time datasets, observational systems, and experimental studies. A key component of the programme is training in Numerical Weather Prediction (NWP), atmospheric modelling, and data assimilation, supported by hands-on use of observational instruments, including solar radiometers, a nephelometer, and meteorological sensors. Students also gain experience in analysing atmospheric datasets, reanalysis products, and model outputs to understand variability and predictability. With its strong emphasis on fundamental science, modelling, and observational analysis, the programme prepares Graduates for specialised careers in meteorology, climate science, operational forecasting, disaster risk reduction, and renewable energy applications, as well as for advanced research and national-level competitive examinations such as CSIR-NET.

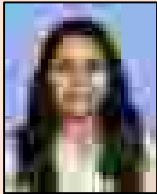
b) Major Facilities:

The M.Sc. Atmospheric Science programme is supported by well-developed laboratory, observational, and computational facilities. These facilities enable effective teaching and learning, hands-on training, and research in atmospheric and climate sciences. The programme benefits from specialised observational infrastructure housed within the Aerosol Observatory, Meteorological Tower and Remote Sensing Laboratory, including advanced instruments such as radiometers for radiometric measurements, Nephelometer and QCM for aerosol characterisation, and sun photometers for aerosol optical depth estimation. These instruments support detailed studies of aerosol-radiation interactions, atmospheric optics, and air-sea exchange processes. The computational infrastructure further enables numerical modelling, data assimilation, and analysis of large atmospheric datasets, including reanalysis and forecast model outputs.

1. INTERNATIONAL STUDIES DISCIPLINE

The M.A. International Studies Programme is the flagship offering of the School of International and Area Studies, having been in pedagogic vogue for two decades and more. The M.A. Programme which is a full-time Two-year (four Semesters) Degree, involves interdisciplinary instruction and attendant research, drawing on perspectives specific to the emergent discipline of International Relations, but also from International Politics, Economics, History, Law, and Security and Strategic Studies, with a view to offering students a holistic and integrated understanding of the rudiments, as also the nuances and intricacies, of the field of International Affairs. The Programme is particularly attractive on account of the widespread availability of Optional Courses on offer, beholding deeper insights into thematic subjects and topical regional dynamics alike. The Syllabi of the M.A. Programme tend to be revised and updated pursuant to changing trends, once every three to four years. The SIAS is unique in so far as it consistently attracts students from a slew of nationalities across the Global South under the aegis of ICCR Scholarships, across both Masters and PhD. programmes.

Furthermore, the SIAS has been disseminating its long-standing expertise in mentoring research and proffering policy relevant consultancy, to seminal national institutions, such as the Naval War College (NWC) at INS Mandovi Goa, as also to the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) and the Ministry of Defence (MoD) think tanks viz., the Indian Council of World Affairs (ICWA) and the Manohar Parrikar Institute for Defence Studies and Analyses (MP-IDSA), New Delhi. Notwithstanding, the School has lately been endeavouring to integrate linguistic teaching with established instruction on International Relations by offering the Spanish and Japanese languages as 'Certificate of Proficiency' Programmes, with a view to undertaking Korean and Mandarin language teaching, going forward. 2. PUBLIC ADMINISTRATION DISCIPLINE

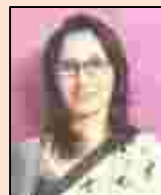
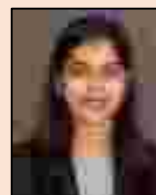

The school offers a two-year M.Sc. (80 credits) and a PhD. Programmes in Physics, Electronics, and Mathematics, and Vocational Programmes in Embedded Technology.

1. PHYSICS DISCIPLINE

The physics discipline offers an M.Sc. in physics with specialisations in solid-state physics, computational physics, and biophysics, where faculty emphasise teaching and cutting-edge research across a wide range of topics in physics and materials science. The academic curriculum is designed with multiple elective courses to prepare students in multi-disciplinary areas of science and technology. It has well-equipped teaching laboratories with novel experiments in Physics. Students are oriented in using modern laboratory techniques as well as

estimating uncertainties in measured and derived quantities. The thrust area of research is experimental and theoretical Condensed Matter Physics. The faculty are actively involved in studying structural, magnetic, optical, and transport properties of different types of materials ranging from glass and glass ceramics, nanomaterials and nanostructures, luminescent materials, magnetic shape-memory alloys, superconductors, electrocatalysts, energy storage materials, etc., to understand the underlying basic physical mechanism as well as to develop new materials for applications. Some efforts are also concentrated on understanding quantum phase transitions in Bosonic systems. Over the years, it has established state-of-the-art characterization facilities through individual research grants from national funding agencies like DST-SERB, CSIR, BRNS, etc., and assistance through DSTFIST and UGC-SAP. This has resulted in 37 PhD. these, over 250 research articles in national and international journals of high reputation, and several hundred national and international conference presentations. Recently, faculty members of this School and the School of Chemical Sciences have established a state-of-the-art laboratory for Materials characterization under RUSA 2.0. Faculty members have also established strong national and international collaborations with peers in leading Universities and Institutions and completed international collaboration projects.

Several National and International Conferences, Symposia, and Meetings attracting internationally renowned scholars in the subject are organised. For the benefit of its research students, workshops and courses like GIAN and DST-SERB School Courses are conducted regularly.

2. ELECTRONICS DISCIPLINE

A candidate eligible for admission to a programme leading to the Degree of Master of Science in Electronics must have passed the examination of the Degree of Bachelor of Science with Physics/Computer Science/ Electronics of this University or from any other recognised University.

The thrust area of the master's programme is embedded systems, supported by the UGC under an innovative programme. Summer Internship as well as industry-associated minor and major projects are highlights of this programme. It has projects in the areas of Biometrics, Hyper Spectral Imaging, Data Communications System, Biomedical, and Agricultural Electronics.

i. B.VOC. IN ELECTRONICS DISCIPLINE

The programme is aligned with the National Skills Qualifications Framework (NSQF), an initiative of the Ministry of Human Resource Development (MHRD), the Government of India, aimed at enhancing students' skills and knowledge in accordance with industry requirements

to support economic growth and social development. The curriculum has been developed in consultation with the Electronics Sector Skills Council of India to provide industry-relevant competencies in embedded technology such as Internet of Things (IoT) and Artificial Intelligence (AI).

It adopts a flexible and modular structure with multiple entry and exit options, allowing learners to pursue employment at various stages and re-enter education later to upgrade their qualifications and skill sets, either for career advancement or higher education. Through this programme, students gain practical expertise in embedded system development, IoT architectures, sensor integration, and AI-based applications, preparing them to meet current industry demands.

3. MATHEMATICS DISCIPLINE

a) Introduction:

The Mathematics Discipline opens doors to students with a strong interest in the Mathematical Sciences, offering them the opportunity to study a wide variety of courses, both intensive training in the subject and shaping curious minds into analytical thinkers, problem solvers, and leaders in academia, industry, and beyond. The Discipline has competent faculty with wide knowledge in pure and applied Mathematics, offering M.Sc. and PhD. programmes.

The Discipline also offers a doctoral research programme for highly motivated students desiring to pursue an academic or industrial career in Mathematics. The thrust areas for the PhD. programme are Functional Analysis, Graph Theory, Differential Equations, Lie Algebra, Number Theory, and Combinatorics. Most of the Graduates from the Mathematics Discipline have distinguished careers in Education. The track record in this regard shows that our alumni have occupied leading positions in Educational Institutions across Goa.

The discipline is greatly involved in teaching and research and in sharing the knowledge with social sectors through organising Winter Schools, various students-centric Workshops, Publications, Lectures, Collaborations, etc. Faculty members collaborated with nationally and internationally renowned Mathematicians. National and international level conferences as well as state level symposiums have been organised in order to enhance professional development and networking opportunities.

b) Major facilities:

i) **Physics:** Over the years, it has established good facilities for research in Condensed Matter Physics and Materials Science. The facilities include: Programmable High Temperature Furnaces (up to 1600° C), Tri Arc Furnace, Pulse laser deposition system, Vacuum thermal deposition system, Electrophoretic deposit setup, Spin coating unit, Vacuum sealing facility, Glove-box,

Sieve Shaker, Low speed Diamond wheel Cutter, Lapping and Polishing Machine, Rotating anode based X-ray diffractometer, Optical Microscopes, FTIR and UV-Vis spectrometers, Photoluminescence Spectrometers, DC and AC Electrical Resistivity, Thermopower apparatus (ambient to 10K), Dielectric Bridge (10Hz – 3 MHz, ambient to 500° C), Electrochemical analysis, Differential Scanning Calorimeter (-140°C to 600°C), Thermo-gravimetric analyser(ambient – 1100°C), Dynamical Mechanical Analyser (0.01Hz – 100Hz, -140°C to 600°C), Computer Cluster, Optical microscope with integrated optical trapping system and fluorescence imaging etc.

ii) Electronics: UV/Visible/NIR Spectrophotometer, UV-VIS-NIR Fibre-optic spectrometer, Spectrum analyser, portable Signal Generator and Analyser up to 3 GHz range, MIMO Communication system. Hyper-spectral Imaging setup, Isolation table, various lasers and light sources. 20-Channel EEG, ECG, and EMG Biomedical system. ALTERA Semiconductors technology developments boards for DSP, Image processing, trans receiver, Ethernet; Controllers developments boards for PIC,89C52, ARM7/9, NI Speedy; Xilinx IDE ISE 7.1, MATLAB 2019, Lab View, TRI India Robotics development kits, VLSI, CAD tools (P-Spice), Micro wind, etc.

iii) Mathematics: The discipline of Mathematics is equipped with its own library, apart from the University Library. It is well stocked with an extensive collection of books (about 4000) on a variety of titles covering pure and applied Mathematics as well as Statistics. This Library is established using grants received from NBHM.

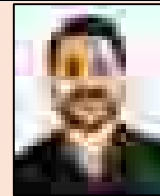
iv) Vocational Programme: The programme is supported by well-equipped electronics, embedded, and networking laboratories. They focus on integrating emerging technologies, with a special emphasis on embedded technology for the Internet of Things (IoT) and embedded AI, providing students with practical exposure to state-of-the-art resources.

c) Other highlights:

The discipline of Physics received support under DST-FIST (Level-I, Phase II), UGC-SAP (DSA-Phase III), and Infrastructure Programmes. PhD. in Electronics is supported by the Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology, New Delhi. Research Laboratories, Institutes and Universities in India and abroad (after PhD.), Teaching in Schools (with B.Ed.) and colleges/Universities (with NET/SET). It is one of the centres recognised by the Indian Academy of Sciences, Bangalore, for conducting the Experimental Physics Refresher Courses on behalf of the Joint Science Education Panel of the three national science academies.

The school offers a two-year M.Sc. (80 credits) and a PhD. Programmes in Physics, Electronics, and Mathematics, and B. Voc. Programmes in Electronics, Instrumentation, and Computer Networking.

1. PHILOSOPHY DISCIPLINE

a) Introduction:

M.A. Programme in Philosophy focuses on developing critical acumen in students about philosophical issues and problems both in the Western and Indian Traditions of Philosophizing. The approach adopted for this purpose is largely analytical, critical, and hermeneutical. The Discipline offers a wide range of courses in Indian Philosophy, Western Philosophy, Continental Philosophy, Logic, and Ethics.

The PhD. The programme in Philosophy encourages critical, hermeneutical, and analytical studies on classical as well as contemporary domains of philosophy, both Indian and Western. Over the years, the focus of research has been on Applied Ethics, Phenomenology, Philosophy of Religion, Environmental Ethics, Vedanta, and Ethics of Pedagogy.

The School of Sanskrit, Philosophy and Indic Studies (SSPIS) is the outcome of integrating two separate academic units at Goa University, namely, the Discipline of Philosophy, one of the oldest Disciplines, and the nascent School of Sanskrit and Indic Knowledge Systems into a composite whole for wider and deeper engagements. Academic study of Philosophy at Goa University was initially part of the then Centre for Post-Graduate Instruction and Research of the University of Bombay (CPIR-1967). Subsequently, when Goa University came into existence, it became one of the constituent Disciplines.

Currently, the SSPIS offers Master's as well as Doctoral studies in Philosophy, encompassing both the Indian and Western Philosophical specialisations. As Philosophy overarches beyond any specific subject matter as far as it involves systematic investigation into various sources and methodologies of knowledge, the Master's Programme in Philosophy at Goa University offers a wide range of courses, both as Core and as Optional, that aim to develop critical awareness in understanding other disciplines and subject matters. Based on the classical foundations of philosophy, the curriculum addresses contemporary developments and prepares the students for an informed and meaningful life. The small classroom size serves the learning ecosystem well. Opportunities for student exchange Programmes are also available for students with reputed Universities abroad.

SSPIS has a very robust research programme, and students from other reputed universities, both from India and abroad, pursue their studies here. Over the years, with sustained efforts of the faculty and students, the Philosophy Programme at Goa University has been able to embark on the path towards excellence in teaching and learning. Prof. Ramakant A. Sinari, Prof

A.V. Afonso, Prof. U.A. Vinayakumar, Dr Milan B. Desai, Prof. A. Raghuramaraju, and Prof. C.A. Tomy were faculty members of Philosophy here and had contributed to the growth of the discipline.

2. SANSKRIT STUDIES DISCIPLINE

a) Introduction:

The newly established discipline currently offers an M.A. in Sanskrit Studies, which focuses on courses like Grammar, Literature, Indian Philosophy, and Veda-Vedangas. The programme encourages and enables the students to pursue research in the different domains of Sanskrit Studies. In the near future, SSPIS will offer a programme of studies in Computational Linguistics, Pali and Buddhist Studies, besides Philosophy and Sanskrit. Through these academic Programmes, SSPIS aims to explore the dialogical potentials of our ancient knowledge and wisdom traditions with our contemporary concerns in order to build a cosmopolitan knowledge community, capable of addressing the societal challenges from the perspective of the Humanities discipline aimed at moulding enlightened citizens.

b) Major facilities:

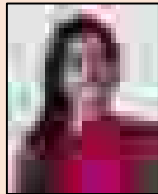

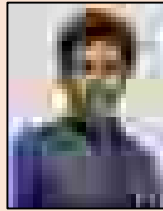

1. ENGLISH DISCIPLINE

The Discipline offers a Post-Graduate Programme in English and provides opportunities for doctoral research leading to a PhD. in English. Cultural Studies, translation studies, and gender studies are allied areas of study for the Discipline.

2. FRENCH DISCIPLINE

Since our inception in 1965, we have had a long tradition of teaching and research in the domain of French and Francophone Studies. The Discipline of French and Francophone Studies focuses on the extensive and intensive teaching and learning of Language, Literature, and Culture of France and Francophone Countries through robust Academic Programmes and a mosaic of workshops, seminars, and cultural activities. It has been a much-appreciated and established Centre of Excellence in the field of French Studies in India. At present, the Discipline offers the following Programmes: Bachelor of Arts (Hons.) (four-year Degree), Master of Arts (two-year Degree), PhD. And Certificate/Diploma/Advanced Diploma in French. The Discipline has incorporated the latest methodologies and approaches to teaching and learning French, which efficiently enable a learner to meet linguistic and professional needs in diverse scenarios.

Simultaneously, students get opportunities to interact and train with native French speakers and experts and participate in field trips and exchange Programmes with institutions abroad.

3. HINDI DISCIPLINE

The School offers M.A. and PhD. Programmes in Hindi. It lays emphasis on Indian Literature, Hindi, Marathi and Konkani, Medieval and Modern Poetry, Novels, Fiction, Criticism, Journalism and Mass Media, and Translation. The School also offers an opportunity to conduct research in the above areas.

4. KONKANI DISCIPLINE

This Discipline is the only one of its kind in the country, offering M.A. in Konkani language and literature and has research Programmes leading to PhD. in any area aboutto Konkani Language and Literature. It also has various projects from Sahitya Academy, NCERT, UGC, CIIL and other bodies taken up by individual staff members who also have expertise in several Indian and foreign languages and translation. Along with the School of Computer Science and Technology, the Discipline of Konkani is actively involved in interdisciplinary research pertaining to Natural Language Processing (NLP).

5. MARATHI DISCIPLINE

The thrust areas of the Programme include Grammar and Linguistics, Theory of Literature and Translation Studies, Medieval Literature, Christian Marathi Tradition of the 17th Century in Goa, Modern Forms of Literature, Marathi Literature in Goa, Dalit, Rural and Folk Literature, and Science Fiction in Marathi.

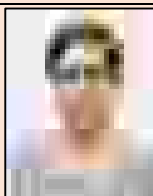
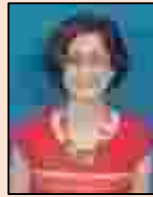
6. PORTUGUESE AND LUSOPHONE STUDIES DISCIPLINE

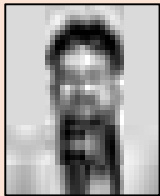
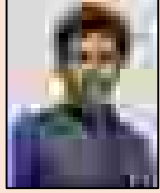

The Bachelor's Programme in Portuguese aims at achieving better Linguistic Competencies at the end of which students may pursue employment or a Master's Degree in Portuguese.

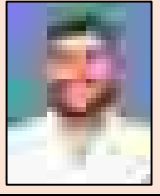

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FUNDING SUPPORT FOR STUDENTS

1. RESEARCH STUDENTSHIP:

Applications are invited for the award of a Research Studentship from full-time Research Scholars who are registered for the PhD. Degree Programme in the University Schools and those who are not recipients of any other scholarship/studentship, etc.

Applications in the prescribed form, available in the respective discipline/programme of the school and also on the Goa University website, should be submitted along with certified copies of required documents, duly recommended, and forwarded by their Research Guide to the Directorate Office. The last date to receive applications will be notified separately. For more information, you can click the following link. (<https://www.unigoa.ac.in/goa-University-contentarticle.php?id=71>).

Conditions for the awards of Research Studentship:

1. Full-time Research Scholars should have at least a second class at the graduation level and have obtained a Master's Degree by securing a minimum of 55% or equivalent grade, and/or by research from Goa University, or from any other University recognised by Goa University, and whose PhD. registration has been confirmed.
2. Research scholars at Goa University receive stipends ranging of ₹14,000 per month, depending on the fellowship. Full-time PhD. scholars who are not receiving other scholarships are eligible for university studentships.
3. Only those Research Scholars whose PhD. registration is confirmed shall be eligible to apply for the Studentship.
4. Full-time Research Scholars holding any other scholarship are not eligible to apply.
5. Candidates should not have completed more than eight terms on the date of application.
6. In case the six-monthly reports are not satisfactory, the Research Studentship is likely to be terminated.
7. A declaration from the candidates that they are not employed should be submitted after the issue of the sanction order.
8. Applications will be screened by the [Research Studentship Committee](#), and its decision will be final.
9. Research Scholars shall have to sign the attendance register available in the Office of the respective Discipline/ Programme twice a day, in the morning and in the evening.
10. Ordinarily, the fellowship shall be for a period of two years from the date of its award. However, the fellowship may be continued for the 3rd year on recommendation of the Committee to the Vice-Chancellor for approval subject to the following conditions:

- i. There has been significant progress made by the Scholars in research work.
 - ii. The applicant has published research paper/s involving her/his journals included in the UGC CARE list as of 11/02/2025.
10. Research Scholars who have been awarded the scholarship are required to apply for continuation of the fellowship during the second year, which will be based on the recommendation of their Research Guide based on the research work carried out by the applicant.
 11. Research Scholars are required to return the fellowship amount paid to them by the University, in case their PhD. registration is terminated, or they are unable to complete the programme. Research Scholar shall be required to submit an undertaking to this effect.
 12. Scholars selected for the Goa University Research Studentship will be entitled to 30 days' leave in an academic year. Leave beyond 30 days will be without scholarship.

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3. DIRECTORATE OF STUDENTS' WELFARE AND CULTURAL AFFAIRS

The students' welfare activities at Goa University are looked after by the Directorate of Students' Welfare and Cultural Affairs. b) MERIT SCHOLARSHIP/FREE STUDENTSHIP/ STUDENT AID FUND:

University Scholarship applications will be invited via Online mode from eligible Under Graduate, Post-Graduate, and Post-Graduate diploma students enrolled in various Schools on the University Campus for the Award of Merit Scholarship, Free Studentship, and Student Aid Fund for the current Academic Year.

The students who are interested in applying for the Merit Scholarship, Free Studentship, and Student Aid Fund shall fill out the prescribed Online Scholarship application and submit the application complete in all respects along with the necessary documents using the Online application form.

The last date to receive applications will be notified separately on the University website.

Conditions for the award of Merit Scholarship/Free Studentship/are as under:

a) MERIT SCHOLARSHIP

1. A candidate at the qualifying examination should have secured at least 65% of aggregate marks in the last qualifying examination.

b) FREE STUDENTSHIP

1. The applicant should belong to an income group not exceeding Rs. 3,00,000/- per annum in the previous Financial Year 2025-26.
2. The candidate should have secured at least 45% of aggregate marks at the last qualifying examination with no backlog.
3. The applicant should be a resident of Goa for 15 years.

c) STUDENT AID FUND

Under the Students' Aid Fund, deserving students are given financial assistance to meet their expenses on tuition fees, examination fees, purchase of books, etc.

1. The applicant should belong to the income group not exceeding Rs. **1,50,000/- per annum** for the Financial Year 2025-26.
2. The candidate should not have any backlog in the last qualifying examination.
3. The applicant should be a resident of Goa for 15 years.

Those students availing the benefits under any other Schemes/ Scholarships shall not be eligible to avail similar benefits under the Goa University Scholarships (Merit Scholarship/ Free Studentship/ Student Aid Fund). The students would, however, be permitted to exercise their choice of the Schemes/ Scholarships to avail similar benefits.

2. PLATEAUNICA

This is an Inter-Faculty Youth Festival organised by the Goa University Campus Students' Union. The festival offers an opportunity for the Post-Graduate Students to exhibit their talents in the fields of Art, culture, and Literature. This festival is held for 2-3 days in the first week of February every year.

3. SPORTS



The Sports Section organises Inter Collegiate Championship tournaments annually for men and women in the following events: Badminton, Table Tennis, Judo, Weight Lifting, Power Lifting, Best Physique, Chess, Cross Country, Cycling, Tennis, Tennikoit, Basketball, Swimming, Football, Athletics, Kabaddi, Handball, Hockey, Kho-Kho, Volleyball, Cricket, Taekwondo, Baseball. The winners and runners-up are awarded trophies, medals, and certificates.



Goa University conducts selection trials to select the best players to represent the University at the Inter-University Championships organised by Universities across the Country. Expenditure towards coaching camps, lodging, boarding, kit, and travel is borne by the University. Students participating in Intercollegiate and Inter-University Championships are given the benefit of Sports Merit Marks as per Goa University Ordinances. All sports activities are organised systematically and in a sporting atmosphere as per the schedule, approved by the Sports Council of Goa University.

4. EXTRA-MURAL STUDIES AND EXTENSION SERVICES (EMSandES):

The Directorate of Extra-Mural Studies and Extension Services was established on 20th June 1986 as per Article (5) of the Goa University Act. Extra Mural Studies and Extension Services are essentially a third dimension of Higher Education. The first two dimensions are formal teaching and research. The third dimension visualises a learning society at large. It includes adults, School drop-outs, professionals, housewives, slum population, street children, and a host of learning groups who need not necessarily have a formal qualification to learn certain essential inputs.

The objectives of the Directorate are as follows:

- (a) To impart instruction to those who could not undergo normal education, but whose desire to be educated has remained intact.
 - (b) To interact at all levels of education: Primary, Secondary, and Higher Secondary. Non-formal education of adults, particularly women, farmers, workers, and others whose understanding, skills, status, etc. need to be uplifted.
 - (c) To participate in rural development activities and to undertake action-oriented research to solve local problems.
 - (d) To make the common man aware of the impact of science and technology on daily life and to promote a scientific outlook and proper utilisation of the products of science and technology.
 - (e) To produce reading material and make it available to the people at low prices.
 - (f) To collaborate with local voluntary organisations, industries, research institutions, etc. to promote the objectives of the extra-mural studies and extension services.
 - (g) To make people aware of their past and present history and culture
 - (h) To make people aware of their civil and social responsibility and obligations as well as their rights.

5. RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT AND RESOURCE MOBILISATION (RDRM CELL)

Research is an integral part of the academic activities of the Post-Graduate Discipline of the University. R&D Projects and Consultancies are carried out by the faculty members of Goa University. D-RDRM processes/reviews all research proposals to be submitted by University faculty to the funding agencies. It also coordinates between the funding agencies and the Project Investigator at the University for approved projects. To incentivize research and improve the quality of publications of faculty members, D-RDRM provides monetary incentives for research publications in SCOPUS/ Web of Knowledge-indexed journals.

RDRM assists the Intellectual Property Assessment Committee of the University in assessing the applications submitted by faculty members to file patents. It maintains a profile of faculty expertise and a list of the infrastructural facilities at the University for circulation to potential industry partners. RDRM also arranges meetings between potential industry partners, funding agency representatives, and the University faculty for the promotion of sponsored research and new funding schemes.

(i) RESEARCH POLICY

D-RDRM implements the research policy of the University. The main aim of this policy is to help the University and its faculty members achieve excellence in research and contribute to societal and public good. To incentivise research and improve the quality of publications of faculty members, D-RDRM provides a monetary incentive for research publications in SCOPUS/Web of Knowledge-indexed journals. 7. HEALTH CENTRE



The University Health Centre is a primary medical care unit on the University campus for the benefit of students, staff, and their family members. It provides preventive, curative, and promotive services at the primary level. The facilities include:

(a) Digital Learning and Initiatives (DDLI)

Goa University has set up Distance Education, Information and Training Infrastructure (DEITI) funded by the Distance Education Council (Govt. of India) under the Ministry of Human Resource. The setup is meant to cater to distance education for the people of Goa through satellite technology. There are 25 DRS (Direct Reception System) centres set up at selected Colleges and Higher Secondary Schools covering all 12 Talukas.

The DEITI is well equipped with its state-of-the-art studio, having all kinds of facilities for audio-video recording and editing. The DEITI also organises live interactive Programmes where the students and teachers interact with the Resource persons on the specific subject. The studio facility is also made available on a commercial basis for indoor/outdoor shooting, recording, and editing at reasonable rates.

(c) Study Japan Programme (SJP)

Goa University offers a one-month Study Japan Programme as part of its student exchange Programme with the College of International Relations, Nihon University, Mishima, Japan. The course includes a 40-hour module on Japanese Society, Culture, Business, and International Relations, which introduces the students to the various facets of Contemporary Japan. Apart from doing sessions along with the students of Nihon University, the students are also taken to field trips to various important locations in the vicinity of Mishima. perspective and personality building. Partial scholarships are also offered to five students who are selected each year after a due screening process. The announcement for the Programme usually comes in January every year. So far, five batches of students have availed of this Programme.

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FACILITIES AND OTHER ACTIVITIES

a) LIBRARY:



The Goa University Library and Information Centre was set up on 30th of June 1985 around the nucleus of the Library of the Centre for Post-Graduate Research and Instruction, University of Bombay. The initial collection numbered 37,678 books and several bound volumes of periodicals. Today, our holdings have crossed 1,55,000 books covering a wide range of disciplines under Humanities, Social Science, and Pure and Applied Sciences, especially Microbiology, Marine Science, Environmental Science, Computer Science, Geology, Management, and other disciplines, including a special collection on Latin America and the Caribbean. The Library also has a large collection of titles in Konkani, the state language of Goa and a foreign language section which includes titles in Portuguese, French, and Spanish. Our Library acquires around 3000 books and over 350 periodicals every year. It also receives more than 150 periodicals gifted by various organisations and institutions. Goa University Library is a designated Repository Library of United Nations' publications since 1996.

In addition to these, our Library has a collection of rare books on Indo-Portuguese History and Culture donated by the late Dr P. S. S. Pissurlencar (about 5000 books in various Languages). Mr Nuno Gonsalves of Portugal and numerous others have donated their collections to the University for the use of scholars of Goa and the neighbouring regions. A bibliography of these resources is currently available in print form. The Goa University Library is the single largest centre of academic resources in the State of Goa and caters not only to the needs of the

academic community of the state but also serves many scientific, historical and social science researchers from neighbouring States.

ONE NATION ONE SUBSCRIPTION “ONOS”

The Prime Minister of India in his address to the Nation from the ramparts of the Red Fort on 15th August, 2022, had pointed out the importance of Research and Development in our country in the Amrit Kaal. He had given the clarion call of "Jai Anusandhan" on the occasion. The National Education Policy, 2020 (NEP 2020) has also identified research as a corequisite for outstanding education and development in our country. In response to the vision of making India Atmanirbhar and Viksitbharat@2047, the Government of India approved One Nation One Subscription scheme to provide country-wide access to international high impact scholarly research articles and journal publications to students, faculty and researchers of all Higher Education Institutions managed by the central government and state governments and Research & Development Institutions of the central government.

With the successful completion of computerising the database of bibliographic details and automating its services, our Library is on the threshold of embarking on its new role, that of an information resource centre at the service of the academic community of this region, in addition to its traditional function of holding and disseminating of books.

2) Library Website:

The Library website is available under the URL <http://library.unigoa.ac.in> this website has a Knowledge Portal which links to the various online e-resources subscribed as well as free for the use of the students and faculty. The e-resources provided by the INFLIBNET Centre, Ahmedabad,

are available through the library website. Faculty and students get access to various full-text and bibliographic databases through the UGC Info net Digital Library link in the knowledge portal. There are federated search engines like <https://www.unigoa.ac.in/facilities/library.html> available for searching the library resources. The library also supports the maintenance of the University Repository which, is available at <http://irgu.unigoa.ac.in/drs/>

3) Library Catalogue:

The library presently has 1,80,898 books, and its bibliographic details are stored in an Open-Source software, KOHA, on a designated server at the Computer Centre of the University. This database is now available on the Internet under the URL <http://libcat.unigoa.ac.in> students and Faculty can check the availability of books, reserve books and check the renewal dates through the interface available globally.

b) EARTH SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY CELL AND CENTRE OF EXCELLENCE IN MARINE MICROBIOLOGY

The Cell functions under the guidance of the Management Board constituted by the Ministry of Earth Sciences, with the Vice Chancellor, Goa University, as the Chairperson.

b) UGC – MALAVIYA MISSION TEACHER TRAINING CENTRE (UGC-MMTTC)



This Centre has been functioning at the University campus since 1988 and is regularly conducting the required Faculty Induction Programme, Refresher and other Programmes for the Teaching Faculty at PG Discipline and affiliated Colleges/Institutes of Goa University and other Universities in the country. Being one among similar colleges set up and funded by the UGC in different Universities, this Centre has played a major role in the training of University/College teachers in a commendable way. The activities of the Centre have been further focused to include Internet/specialized subject-specific software as an integral part of Faculty Induction Programmes.

d) UNIVERSITY SCIENCE INSTRUMENTATION CENTRE (USIC)

University Science Instrumentation Centre (USIC) is a central instrumentation facility of the University consisting of Electronics, Mechanical and Glass Blowing workshops managed by faculty, officers, and trained technicians. Energy Dispersive X-Ray Analysis (EDX), referred to as EDS or EDAX, has been installed as a part of the Scanning Electron Microscope (SEM) at USIC. EDS is an X-ray technique used to identify the elemental composition of materials. In addition to this, the SEM facility can be used for Image morphology of samples, image composition, and some bonding differences, undertake micro and nano lithography, and so on. The centre was established in 1990 during the Eighth Five-Year Plan period with an independent building having

250 sq. meters, housing all three workshops. The main aim is to strengthen the laboratories of the user Discipline by way of equipment maintenance, calibration of test and measuring instruments, fabrication of gadgets and instruments, attachments required for some imported instruments, so as to adapt them to Indian electrical standards, etc. The Glass Blowing workshop is mostly involved in the design and fabrication of glass apparatus as per the design submitted by researchers, which are otherwise not generally available in the market, and it also undertakes repair of costly glass apparatus. The work undertaken by USIC can be broadly classified as analytical services for sophisticated instruments, maintenance of equipment for the Languages and Science Laboratory, fabrication of teaching aids, and development of new instruments, thus covering the entire objective of USIC.

(e) REMOTE SENSING LABORATORY

A Remote Sensing Laboratory has been established with financial assistance from the Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO). The facilities of the laboratory include hardware consisting of five computers and software necessary for image processing. An image processing package such as ERDAS IMAGINE has been procured. An interdisciplinary Programme has been introduced across the different faculties where the remote sensing technique has application. The laboratory provides hands-on training to students who opt for an interdisciplinary Programme on remote sensing and research and thus caters to the country's need for trained manpower in this field. All the instruments necessary for in-situ observations of radiance and irradiance, a spectrophotometer for analysing the optically active constituents from samples, and a sun photometer for measuring aerosol optical depth have also been procured. At present, there are many RandD projects funded by different agencies like the Naval Research Board, the Space Applications Centre, the Space Physics Laboratory of VSSC, ISRO, and the Indian National Centre for Ocean Information Service of the Ministry of Earth Sciences, Delhi. All these projects are carried out by the Discipline of Marine Sciences, for which the laboratory has been used extensively.

(f) MATERIALS CHARACTERIZATION LABORATORY

Goa University has set up a University Laboratory for Materials Characterisation (ULMC) with assistance from Rastriya Uchchatar Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA) for researchers from the University campus, affiliated colleges, and other research institutions.

The laboratory consists of state-of-the-art facilities like an X-ray Diffractometer, Raman Spectrometer, GC×GC and TOF Mass Spectrometer, and SQUID magnetometer. In addition, it also has a liquid nitrogen production facility, which will supply liquid nitrogen to the users. Instrument time will be available on a prior booking and payment basis.

(g) COMPUTER CENTRE, CAMPUS NETWORK AND INTERNET FACILITY

All the Disciplines of the University are connected with a 1 Gbps fibre optic backbone. The connectivity is distributed using Cat 6 UTP, designed using Structured Cabling standards. Each Discipline is on a separate VLAN with routing through L3 switches, placed at the distribution level in each building. The facility is secured through a world-class UTM (Universal Threat Management) hardware firewall, and the wireless is maintained using a controller-based hardware device. The internet facility is provided through a 1 Gbps 1:1 Internet Lease Line (ILL) from NKN and a 100 Mbps 1:1 ILL through a Private Operator. Both the links are working in aggregation mode with failover switching.

The Goa University Centre houses a Smart Cabinet-based mini Data Centre, which provides Super Computing, Parallel Processing, and Deep Learning facilities through PARAM (Shavak), a Super Computer from C-DAC. Software installed on computers assists the students and teaching community in their research, learning, and administrative activities. The Goa University also provides Endpoint Security (Antivirus, Legal version) to students on request. Computer Centre also extends its resources to teachers, students, and research scholars, providing training, DTP, printing, and Computing facilities. Computer Centre is responsible for providing all the IT facilities to the University.

(n) ACCOMMODATION DETAILS:



A HOSTEL ADMISSION

1. Students who are admitted to the Post-Graduate Disciplines of Goa University shall be given priority for admission to the hostels. Research Scholars working in different RandD projects of University Programmes and those registered for PhD Degree students at Goa University are allotted a hostel facility subject to the availability of vacant rooms. Applications of such students shall be forwarded through the concerned Principal Investigator/Supervising teacher and the Head of the Discipline to the competent authority of the University.

2. Admissions to the Hostel and allocation of rooms to students shall be at the discretion of the competent authority of the University.
3. An application for hostel accommodation should be submitted to the Hostel Warden in the prescribed form (which is available with the information bulletin) on payment of Rs. 25/-. The duly filled form should be submitted appended with:
 - a) One recent passport-size and one Identity-card-size photograph.
 - b) A copy of the fee receipt from the University/College for the course for which admission has been secured.
 - c) Certificate of health from a competent medical authority as notified by the Hostel authority.
Foreign students should produce a certificate stating they are free of contagious diseases such as AIDS.
 - d) A Character Certificate from the previous institution where the student was studying.
 - e) Residence proof copy (Residence Certificate/Aadhar card).
 - f) Students who apply for admission to the Ladies' Hostel shall submit a list of residential addresses and contact numbers of persons whom the student may visit or stay with when permission for 'night out' is obtained. This list should be signed by the parent(s).
 - g) For girl students seeking accommodation in the hostel, the local guardian/parent should meet the Warden when the student occupies the room for the first time.
4. Applications from new students should reach the office as per the notification issued by the Warden at the beginning of the academic year. In the case of a registered PhD student, hostel admission will be granted up to March (for those taking admission in January) and up to September (for those taking admission in July) every year. However, research scholars in different R&D projects will be given hostel accommodation as and when they join the particular Discipline of the University, subject to availability of rooms.
5. In the case of PG students, admission will be granted for only one year at a time. Although every effort will be made to accommodate all eligible students in the Hostel, no student can rightfully claim automatic admission for the subsequent year. However, in the case of a registered PhD student/research scholars, admission to the subsequent year will be on the basis of the satisfactory report of the Discipline Research Committee forwarded by the Dean of the Discipline of the concerned faculty to the Chief Warden.
6. For re-admission, the application form, duly forwarded by the Dean and with a copy of the Department fees challan, should reach the Warden's office when hostel admissions are notified.

7. A student should occupy the room allotted to her/him within seven days, failing which admission to the hostel shall stand cancelled.
8. Students will be permitted to stay in the hostel for a maximum of five days after the last day of her/his final examination or the semester, whichever is later. In special cases where a student is required to extend her/his stay at the hostel till 31st May, a request for extension substantiated with valid reasons shall be forwarded through the DEAN for consideration of the Warden. Those who are overstaying will be charged at the rate of Rs. 50/- per day, and this is to be paid via bank challan.

o) FEES:

Note: The fees applicable at present are given below. However, the University administration reserves the right to revise this fee structure from time to time, and such revised fees shall be applicable.

9. Rent to be paid by Research scholars and scholars registered for PhD. Degree

10. No fees paid in connection with the hostel admission, except the Caution Deposit, will be refunded or adjusted. However, under certain extraordinary and genuine situations, the competent authorities may consider the same, entirely at their discretion.
11. Regular students of Goa University shall not be permitted to reside at the hostel on a daily payment basis. However, students seeking a temporary stay during sports events, “Plateaunica”, research field trips, etc. shall be permitted to stay in the hostel on a daily basis with the prior payment of the fees and approval of the Convener, Hostel Management Committee. Such a facility may be availed by a student only once during an academic term, and the maximum period of stay is 15 days.
12. The annual hostel fee is to be paid in one instalment at the time of admission. Cases of students who intend to vacate the hostel for an internship will be dealt with in accordance with the rules and regulations of the University in force at that time.
13. Students admitted to the Hostel shall accept the room allotted to them by the Warden. The Warden reserves the right to re-allocate rooms during the term if the situation so demands.

p) Hostel Discipline Rules:

(Rules detailed below are not exhaustive and may be amended by the University from time to time. Such amendments will be notified on the Hostel Notice Board.)

1. Hostel residents are required to observe the hostel rules and regulations, including the GU Disciplinary Rules 2018, as well as the directives issued by the Warden or the Hostel Management Committee from time to time.
2. Before occupying the room, the resident should inspect all items carefully. If any damage is caused at a later stage, the resident shall be held responsible and necessary charges for the same shall be recovered from her/him.
3. All occupants of the Hostel are required to produce their University Identity Card /Hostel Identity Card before the security personnel while entering the Hostel.
4. Silence hours for study must be observed from 10.00 p.m. to 8.00 a.m. No loud music should be played in the hostel.
5. Women students should sign the Hostel register (kept at the Hostel entrance) before 8.00 p.m. (In case PG students) In the case of research students, the timing is 9.00 p.m. Students with a late pass should sign the register while entering the Ladies' Hostel at night.

6. No girl student will be allowed to spend a night out or enter late after 8.00 p.m. (in case of research students, the timing is 9.00 p.m.) in the hostel without a written request from the Parent or the Local Guardian.
7. For academic assignments, "Late Night Pass" on a daily basis will be issued by the Warden to girl students on the basis of the recommendation of the DEAN / Research supervisor / Project Supervisor.
8. Parents may be received at the Women's Hostel between 4.00 p.m. and 7.00 p.m. on weekdays and from 9.30 a.m. to 11.00 a.m. on Sundays and Public Holidays. Visitors are expected to wait in the 'Visitors' Room' and are not permitted to enter the hostel rooms or the common room.
9. The occupants shall maintain a high standard of personal hygiene and cleanliness. Misuse of bathrooms and toilets is a social offence and should be strictly avoided.
10. Use of electrical appliances such as a hot plate, Immersion Heater, etc. is strictly prohibited. Cooking inside the rooms is also prohibited. Students violating this clause will be liable for payment of a fine up to Rs. 1000/-.
11. All the facilities existing in the hostel should be utilised in a proper manner. The residents shall take care of University property, especially water coolers/ purifiers, geysers, on-off switches, etc. If any misuse of the said facility is observed, a general fine shall be paid by each resident as determined by the Warden, based on the damage caused to the hostel property.
12. Before vacating the Hostel, the student should intimate the Warden and obtain a "NO DUES CERTIFICATE". The application in prescribed form for refund of hostel Caution Deposit should be handed over to the Warden along with the cupboard keys at the time of vacating the Hostel Room.
13. Students going home on holidays or temporarily not residing in the hostel for more than 5 days should inform the Warden about the same in advance and hand over the keys of the room to the hostel authorities.
14. Disfiguring of walls by sticking posters, paintings, etc. in the hostel is strictly prohibited. Similarly, no tampering with the electrical systems, study desk, wardrobes, etc. will be permitted. A fine of Rs. 100/- per incident of indiscipline or as given in The Goa University Students' Discipline and Conduct Rules 2018 shall be charged, and if the same is not paid within 7 days, it shall be deducted from the caution deposit. Fans, tube lights, etc. should be switched off when not required.
15. During repair and maintenance of the rooms/hostel, the occupants shall cooperate with the authorities, and if required, the student may be asked to shift to a different room, as per availability.

16. Smoking is strictly prohibited within the University campus. Possession or Consumption of liquor/drugs and indulging in any other unlawful activity is STRICTLY PROHIBITED on the hostel premises. Students are also not permitted to enter the hostel after consuming alcohol outside the campus.
17. Students are advised not to leave valuables such as gold ornaments, mobile phones, cash, etc. in their rooms. No complaint will be entertained in case of loss/theft.
18. The Chief Proctor and/or Warden is authorised to inspect the hostel rooms at any time without giving any prior notice.
19. No student will be allowed to change an allotted room without the consent of the Warden. Students found violating this rule shall be liable for disciplinary action.
20. Students shall not entertain non-hostelite students or outsiders in their room. Hostelite students violating this clause will be liable for disciplinary action or payment of a fine up to Rs. 500/- as specified in The Goa University Students' Discipline and Conduct Rules 2018. And if the same is not paid within 7 days, it shall be deducted from the caution deposit.
21. Ragging in any form is strictly prohibited. Ragging is a cognizable offence, and any student indulging in such behaviour will be dealt with severely in accordance with the guidelines of the Hon'ble Supreme Court of India and the provisions of the Goa Prevention of Ragging Bill 2007.

Possible punishments for those found guilty of participation in or abetment of ragging include:

- a. Cancellation of admission.
- b. Suspension from attending classes.
- c. Withholding/withdrawing scholarship/fellowship and other benefits.
- d. Debarring from appearing in any test/examinations, etc.
- e. Withholding results.
- f. Debarring from representing the University in any international meet, tournament, youth festival, etc.
- g. Expulsion from the hostel.
- h. Expulsion from the University and consequent debarring from admission to any other institution.
- i. Fine up to Rs. 8000/-
- j. Rigorous imprisonment.

23. Any hostel inmate found guilty of misconduct or breach of the above rules or of gross indiscipline or who is found to be a bad influence on other resident students is liable to be expelled forthwith as per the provisions of The Goa University Students' Discipline and Conduct Rules 2018.
24. PhD. student/research scholars in RandD projects, who are employed, shall not be granted admission to the Hostels. Any research students who take up employment after being admitted to the Hostel will be required to immediately notify the warden of the same and to vacate the Hostel within 7 days of taking up employment.
25. The Chief Proctor and/or Chief Warden reserves the right to break open rooms in case of any suspected violation of hostel rules, suspected unlawful activities, or on the basis of security risk perceived.
26. Once a student vacates the hostel, s/he will not be re-allotted hostel accommodation for a minimum period of 6 months. Every attempt will be made to provide hostel accommodation to all students.
27. Pets of all kinds are prohibited inside the hostel. Feeding stray dogs or cats on the hostel premises is not permitted.
28. All instructions/notices displayed on notice boards will be deemed to have been read by all residents, and excuses for non-compliance with such instructions and notices will not be accepted. Residents are advised to look at the notice board every day to acquaint themselves with the latest information/orders.
29. Plastic Free Zone: Goa University campus is a 'Plastic Free Zone'. Residents should ensure that plastic bags are not used for any purpose whatsoever.
30. Vehicle and Parking: All hostelites are directed not to park their 2-wheelers in front of the entrance. The same should be parked in the designated parking shed/parking lot and should not obstruct normal movement around the hostel.

Note: The hostelites shall note that in the event of any misconduct or indiscipline or ragging in the hostel or for the purpose of maintaining discipline, the provisions of 'The Goa University Students' Discipline and Conduct Rules 2018' shall be applicable.

q) MESS CHARGES

1. It is mandatory for hostel occupants to join the hostel Mess. All students taking admission to the hostel shall have to pay the Mess charges as applicable for the FULL YEAR in advance, along with payment of the hostel fees. It may be noted that a student shall be admitted to the hostel only after full payment of hostel fees and mess fees as above.

2. Local students who may prefer to go home at the weekends are offered the option to pay Mess charges based on of only five days per week (i.e., excluding Saturday and Sunday).
3. Students shall not make any direct payment to the Mess contractor for the standard meals.
4. Evening tea/snacks are included in the Mess charges, and the students are not required to pay towards such facilities availed, if any, directly to the Mess Contractor.
5. Mess will remain closed during the Breaks and Vacations notified in the University Handbook for the year. During vacation and holidays, food will be provided upon prior payment to the Mess Contractor.
6. Students who are officially required to stay away from the hostel for research/sample collection, field trip, etc., for a minimum period of 3 days at a time shall be granted leave of absence from the Mess, provided such a request for exemption is certified by the Dean of the Discipline/research supervisor and submitted to the warden at least 5 days in advance. In such cases, the Mess fees shall be adjusted against pending Mess payments.
7. Due to the annual tendering process, in case the catering service has to be re-tendered, the difference in the amount of fee collected shall have to be borne by the hostel students.

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UGC REGULATIONS ON CURBING THE MENACE OF RAGGING IN HIGHER EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS, 2009.

(Under Section 26 (1)(g) of the University Grants Commission Act, 1956)

PREAMBLE

In view of the directions of the Hon'ble Supreme Court in the matter of "University of Kerala v/s. Council, Principals, Colleges and others" in SLP no. 24295 of 2006 dated 16.05.2007 and that dated 8.05.2009 in Civil Appeal number 887 of 2009, and in consideration of the determination of the Central Government and the University Grants Commission to prohibit, prevent and eliminate the scourge of ragging including any conduct by any student or students whether by words spoken or written or by an act which has the effect of teasing, treating or handling with rudeness a fresher or any other student, or indulging in rowdy or indiscipline activities by any student or students which causes or is likely to cause annoyance, hardship or psychological harm or to raise fear or apprehension thereof in any fresher or any other student or asking any student to do any act which such student will not in the ordinary Programme do and which has the effect of causing or generating a sense of shame, or torment or embarrassment so as to adversely affect the physique or psyche of such fresher or any other student, with or without an intent to derive a sadistic pleasure or showing off power, authority or superiority by a student over any fresher or any other student, in all higher education institutions in the country, and thereby, to provide for the healthy development, physically and psychologically, of all students, the University Grants Commission, in consultation with the Councils, brings forth this Regulation. In exercise of the powers conferred by Clause (g) of sub-section (1) of Section 26 of the University Grants Commission Act, 1956, the University Grants Commission hereby makes the following Regulations, namely;

1. Title, commencement and applicability: -

- (i) These regulations shall be called the "UGC Regulations on Curbing the Menace of Ragging in Higher Educational Institutions, 2009".
- (ii) They shall come into force from the date of their publication in the Official Gazette.
- (iii) They shall apply to all the institutions coming within the definition of an University under subsection (f) of section (2) of the University Grants Commission Act, 1956, and to all institutions deemed to be a University under Section 3 of the University Grants Commission Act, 1956, to all other higher educational institutions, or elements of such universities or institutions, including its discipline, constituent units and all the premises, whether being academic, residential, playgrounds, canteen, or other such premises of such universities, deemed universities and higher educational institutions, whether located within the campus or outside, and to all means of transportation of students, whether public or private, accessed by

students for the pursuit of studies in such universities, deemed universities and higher educational institutions.

2. Objectives: -

To prohibit any conduct by any student or students whether by words spoken or written or by an act which has the effect of teasing, treating or handling with rudeness a fresher or any other student, or indulging in rowdy or indiscipline activities by any student or students which causes or is likely to cause annoyance, hardship or psychological harm or to raise fear or apprehension thereof in any fresher or any other student or asking any student to do any act which such student will not in the ordinary Programme do and which has the effect of causing or generating a sense of shame, or torment or embarrassment so as to adversely affect the physique or psyche of such fresher or any other student, with or without an intent to derive a sadistic pleasure or showing off power, authority or superiority by a student over any fresher or any other student; and thereby, to eliminate ragging in all its forms from universities, deemed universities and other higher educational institutions in the country by prohibiting it under these Regulations, preventing its occurrence and punishing those who indulge in ragging as provided for in these Regulations and the appropriate law in force.

3. What constitutes Ragging: -

Ragging constitutes one or more of the following acts:

- i) any conduct by any student or students, whether by words spoken or written or by an act which has the effect of teasing, treating or handling with rudeness a fresher or any other student;
- ii) indulging in rowdy or disciplinary activities by any student or students which causes or is likely to cause annoyance, hardship, physical or psychological harm or to raise fear or apprehension thereof in any fresher or any other student;
- iii) asking any student to do any act which such student will not in the ordinary Programme do and which has the effect of causing or generating a sense of shame, or torment or embarrassment to adversely affect the physique or psyche of such fresher or any other student;
- (iv) any act by a senior student that prevents, disrupts or disturbs the regular academic activity of any other student or a fresher;
- (v) exploiting the services of a fresher or any other student for completing the academic tasks assigned to an individual or a group of students.

(vi) any act of financial extortion or forceful expenditure burden put on a fresher or any other student by students;

(vii) any act of physical abuse, including all variants of it: sexual abuse, homosexual assaults, stripping, forcing obscene and lewd acts, gestures, causing bodily harm or any other danger to health or person;

(viii) any act or abuse by spoken words, emails, post, public insults, which would also include deriving perverted pleasure, vicarious or sadistic thrill from actively or passively participating in the discomfiture of a fresher or any other student;

(ix) any act that affects the mental health and self-confidence of a fresher or any other student with or without an intent to derive a sadistic pleasure or showing off power, authority or superiority by a student over any fresher or any other student.

4. Definitions: -

(a) In these regulations, unless the context otherwise requires, -

“Act” means the University Grants Commission Act, 1956 (3 of 1956);

“Academic year” means the period from the commencement of admission of students in any Programme of study in the institution up to the completion of academic requirements for that particular year.

“Anti-Ragging Helpline” means the Helpline established under clause (a) of Regulation 8.1 of these Regulations.

“Commission” means the University Grants Commission;

“Council” means a body so constituted by an Act of Parliament or an Act of any State Legislature for setting, or co-ordinating or maintaining standards in the relevant areas of higher education, such as the All India Council for Technical Education (AICTE), the Bar Council of India (BCI), the Dental Council of India (DCI), the Distance Education Council (DEC), the Indian Council of Agricultural Research (ICAR), the Indian Nursing Council (INC), the Medical Council of India (MCI), the National Council for Teacher Education (NCTE), the Pharmacy Council of India (PCI), etc. and the State Higher Education Councils.

“District Level Anti-Ragging Committee” means the Committee, headed by the District Magistrate, constituted by the State Government, for the control and elimination of ragging in institutions within the jurisdiction of the district.

“Head of the institution” means the Vice-Chancellor in case of a University or a deemed-to-be University, the Principal or the Director or such other designation as the executive head of the institution or the college is referred.

“Fresher” means a student who has been admitted to an institution and who is undergoing her/his first year of study in such institution.

“Institution” means a higher educational institution including, but not limited to a University, a deemed to be University, a college, an institute, an institution of national importance set up by an Act of Parliament or a constituent unit of such institution, imparting higher education beyond 12 years of Schooling leading to, but not necessarily culminating in, a Degree (Graduate, Post-Graduate and/or higher level) and/or to a University diploma.

“NAAC” means the National Academic and Accreditation Council established by the Commission under section 12(ccc) of the Act;

“State Level Monitoring Cell” means the body constituted by the State Government for the control and elimination of ragging in institutions within the jurisdiction of the State, established under a State Law or on the advice of the Central Government, as the case may be.

(x) Words and expressions used and not defined herein but defined in the Act or in the General Clauses Act, 1897, shall have the meanings respectively assigned to them in the Act or in the General Clauses Act, 1897, as the case may be.

5. Measures for Prohibition of Ragging at the Institution level: -

No institution or any part of it thereof, including its elements, including, but not limited to, the Discipline constituent units, colleges, centres of studies and all its premises, whether academic, residential, playgrounds, or canteen, whether located within the campus or outside, and in all means of transportation of students, whether public or private, accessed by students for the pursuit of studies in such institutions, shall permit or condone any reported incident of ragging in any form; and all institutions shall take all necessary and required measures, including but not limited to the provisions of these Regulations, to achieve the objective of eliminating ragging, within the institution or outside,

(a) All institutions shall take action in accordance with these Regulations against those found guilty of ragging and/or abetting ragging, actively or passively, or being part of a conspiracy to promote ragging.

6. Measures for Prevention of Ragging at the Institution level: -

(a) An institution shall take the following steps regarding admission or registration of students, namely,
i) Every public declaration of intent by any institution, in any electronic, audio-visual or print or any other media, for admission of students to any Programme of study shall expressly provide that ragging is totally prohibited in the institution, and anyone found guilty of ragging and/or abetting ragging, whether actively or passively, or being a part of a conspiracy to promote ragging, is liable to be punished in accordance with these Regulations as well as under the provisions of any penal law for the time being in force.

ii) The brochure of admission/instruction booklet or the prospectus, whether in print or electronic format, shall prominently print these Regulations in full. Provided that the institution shall also draw attention to any law concerning ragging and its consequences, as may apply to the institution publishing such a brochure of admission/instruction booklet or the prospectus. Provided further that the telephone numbers of the Anti-Ragging Helpline and all the important functionaries in the institution, including but not limited to the Head of the institution, faculty members, members of the Anti-Ragging Committees and Anti-Ragging Squads, District and Sub-Divisional authorities, Wardens of hostels, and other functionaries or authorities where relevant, shall be published in the brochure of admission/instruction booklet or the prospectus.

iii) Where an institution is affiliated to a University and publishes a brochure of admission/instruction booklet or a prospectus, the affiliating University shall ensure that the affiliated institution complies with the provisions of clause (a) and clause (b) of Regulation 6.1 of these Regulations. The application form for admission, enrolment or registration shall contain an affidavit, mandatorily in English and in Hindi and/or in one of the regional languages known to the applicant, as provided in the English language in Annexure I to these Regulations, to be filled up and signed by the applicant to the effect that s/he has read and understood the provisions of these Regulations as well as the provisions of any other law for the time being in force, and is aware of the prohibition of ragging and the punishments prescribed, both under penal laws as well as under these Regulations and also affirm to the effect that s/he has not been expelled and/or debarred by any institution and further aver that s/he would not indulge, actively or passively, in the act or abet the act of ragging and if found guilty of ragging and/or abetting ragging, is liable to be proceeded against under these Regulations or under any penal law or any other law for the time being in force and such action would include but is not limited to debarment or expulsion of such student.

iv) The application form for admission, enrolment or registration shall contain an affidavit, mandatorily in English and in Hindi and/or in one of the regional languages known to the parents/guardians of the applicant, as provided in the English language in Annexure I to these Regulations, to be filled up and signed by the parents/guardians of the applicant to the effect that s/he has read and understood the provisions

the prohibition of ragging and the punishments prescribed, both under penal laws as well as under these Regulations and also affirm to the effect that her/his ward has not been expelled and/or debarred by any institution and further aver that her/his ward would not indulge, actively or passively, in the act or abet the act of ragging and if found guilty of ragging and/or abetting ragging, her/his ward is liable to be proceeded against under these Regulations or under any penal law or any other law for the time being in force and such action would include but is not limited to debarment or expulsion of her/his ward.

v) The application for admission shall be accompanied by a document in the form of, or annexed to, the School Leaving Certificate/Transfer Certificate/Migration Certificate/Character Certificate reporting on the inter-personal/social behavioural pattern of the applicant, to be issued by the School or institution last attended by the applicant, so that the institution can thereafter keep watch on the applicant, if admitted, whose behaviour has been commented in such document. A student seeking admission to a hostel forming part of the institution, or seeking to reside in any temporary premises not forming part of the institution, including a private commercially managed lodge or hostel, shall have to submit additional affidavits countersigned by her/his parents/guardians in the form prescribed in Annexure I and Annexure II to these Regulations respectively along with her/his application. Before the commencement of the academic session in any institution, the Head of the Institution shall convene and address a meeting of various functionaries/agencies, such as Hostel Wardens, representatives of students, parents/ guardians, faculty, district administration including the police, to discuss the measures to be taken to prevent ragging in the institution and steps to be taken to identify those indulging in or abetting ragging and punish them. The institution shall, to make the community at large and the students in particular aware of the dehumanizing effect of ragging, and the approach of the institution towards those indulging in ragging, prominently display posters depicting the provisions of penal law applicable to incidents of ragging, and the provisions of these Regulations and also any other law for the time being in force, and the punishments thereof, shall be prominently displayed on Notice Boards of all Discipline, hostels and other buildings as well as at places, where students normally gather and at places, known to be vulnerable to occurrences of ragging incidents. The institution shall request the media to give adequate publicity to the law prohibiting ragging and the negative aspects of ragging and the institution's resolve to ban ragging and punish those found guilty without fear or favour. The institution shall identify, properly illuminate, and keep a close watch on all locations known to be vulnerable to occurrences of ragging incidents.

vi) The institution shall tighten security in its premises, especially at vulnerable places, and intense policing by the Anti-Ragging Squad, referred to in these Regulations, and volunteers, if any, shall be resorted to at such points at odd hours during the first few months of the academic session. The institution shall utilize the vacation period before the start of the new academic year to launch a publicity campaign against ragging through posters, leaflets and such other means, as may be desirable or required, to promote the

arrangements, including those which anticipate, identify and plan to meet any special needs of any specific section of students, in place well in advance of the beginning of the academic year with an aim to promote the objectives of this Regulation. Every institution shall engage or seek the assistance of professional counsellors before the commencement of the academic session, to be available when required by the institution, for the purposes of offering counselling to freshers and to other students after the commencement of the academic year.

vii) The head of the institution shall provide information to the local police and local authorities on the details of every privately or commercially managed hostel or lodge used for residential purposes by students enrolled in the institution, and the head of the institution shall also ensure that the Anti-Ragging Squad shall ensure vigilance in such locations to prevent the occurrence of ragging therein.

viii) An institution shall, on admission or enrolment or registration of students, take the following steps, namely; Every fresh student admitted to the institution shall be given a printed leaflet detailing to whom s/he has to turn to for help and guidance for various purposes including addresses and telephone numbers, to enable the student to contact the concerned person at any time, if and when required, of the Anti-Ragging Helpline referred to in these Regulations, Wardens, Head of the institution, all members of the anti-ragging squads and committees, relevant district and police authorities.

ix) The institution, through the leaflet specified in clause (a) of Regulation 6.2 of these Regulations, shall explain to the freshers the arrangements made for their induction and orientation, which promote efficient and effective means of integrating them fully as students with those already admitted to the institution in earlier years. The leaflet specified in clause (a) of Regulation 6.2 of these Regulations shall inform the freshers about their rights as bona fide students of the institution and clearly instructing them that they should desist from doing anything, with or against their will, even if ordered to by the seniors' students, and that any attempt of ragging shall be promptly reported to the Anti-Ragging Squad or to the Warden or to the Head of the institution, as the case may be.

x) The leaflet specified in clause (a) of Regulation 6.2 of these Regulations shall contain a calendar of events and activities laid down by the institution to facilitate and complement familiarisation of freshers with the academic environment of the institution. The institution shall, on the arrival of senior students after the first week or after the second week, as the case may be, schedule orientation Programmes as follows, namely;

(i) joint sensitization Programme and counselling of both freshers and senior students by a professional counsellor, referred to in clause of Regulation 6.1 of these Regulations;

(ii) joint orientation Programme of freshers and seniors to be addressed by the Head of the institution and the anti-ragging committee;

- (iii) organisation on a large scale of cultural, sports, and other activities to provide a platform for the freshers and seniors to interact in the presence of faculty members;
- (iv) in the hostel, the warden should address all students and may request two junior colleagues from the college faculty to assist the warden by becoming resident tutors for a temporary duration.
- (v) as far as possible, faculty members should dine with the hostel residents in their respective hostels to instil a feeling of confidence among the freshers. The institution shall set up appropriate committees, including the Programme-in-charge, student advisor, Wardens, and some senior students as its members, to actively monitor, promote, and regulate healthy interaction between the freshers, junior students, and senior students.
- (vi) Freshers or any other student(s), whether being victims or witnesses, in any incident of ragging, shall be encouraged to report such occurrence, and the identity of such informants shall be protected and shall not be subject to any adverse consequence only for the reason of having reported such incidents.
- (vii) Each batch of freshers, on arrival at the institution, shall be divided into small groups and each such group shall be assigned to a member of the faculty, who shall interact individually with each member of the group every day for ascertaining the problems or difficulties, if any, faced by the fresher in the institution and shall extend necessary help to the fresher in overcoming the same.
- (viii) It shall be the responsibility of the member of the faculty assigned to the group of freshers, to coordinate with the Wardens of the hostels and to make surprise visits to the rooms in such hostels, where a member or members of the group are lodged; and such member of faculty shall maintain a diary of her/his interaction with the freshers under her/his charge.
- (ix) Freshers shall be lodged, as far as may be, in a separate hostel block, and where such facilities are not available, the institution shall ensure that access of seniors to accommodation allotted to freshers is strictly monitored by wardens, security guards and other staff of the institution.
- (x) A round-the-clock vigil against ragging in the hostel premises, to prevent ragging in the hostels after the classes are over, shall be ensured by the institution.
- (xi) It shall be the responsibility of the parents/guardians of freshers to promptly bring any instance of ragging to the notice of the Head of the Institution.
- (xii) Every student studying in the institution and her/his parents/guardians shall provide the specific affidavits required under clauses (d), (e) and (g) of Regulation 6.1 of these Regulations at the time of admission or registration, as the case may be, during each academic year.
- (xiii) Every institution shall obtain the affidavit from every student as referred to above in clause (m) of Regulation 6.2 and maintain a proper record of the same and to ensure its safe upkeep thereof, including maintaining the copies of the affidavit in an electronic form, to be accessed easily when required either

by the Commission or any of the Councils or by the institution or by the affiliating University or by any other person or organisation authorised to do so.

(xiv) Every student at the time of her/his registration shall inform the institution about her/his place of residence while pursuing the course of study, and in case the student has not decided her/his place of residence or intends to change the same, the details of his place of residence shall be provided immediately on deciding the same; and specifically regarding to a private commercially managed lodge or hostel where s/he has taken up residence.

(xv) The Head of the institution shall, based on the information provided by the student under clause of Regulation 6.2, apportion sectors to be assigned to members of the faculty, so that such members of faculty can maintain vigil and report any incident of ragging outside the campus or en route while commuting to the institution using any means of transportation of students, whether public or private.

(xvi) The Head of the institution shall, at the end of each academic year, send a letter to the parents/guardians of the students who are completing their first year in the institution, informing them about these Regulations and any law for the time being in force prohibiting ragging and the punishments thereof as well as punishments prescribed under the penal laws, and appealing to them to impress upon their wards to desist from indulging in ragging on their return to the institution at the beginning of the academic session next.

(a) Every institution shall constitute the following bodies, namely,

(i) Every institution shall constitute a Committee to be known as the Anti-Ragging Committee to be nominated and headed by the Head of the institution, and consisting of representatives of civil and police administration, local media, Non-Government Organisations involved in youth activities, representatives of faculty members, representatives of parents, representatives of students belonging to the freshers' category as well as senior students, non-teaching staff; and shall have a diverse mix of membership in terms of levels as well as gender. It shall be the duty of the Anti-Ragging Committee to ensure compliance with the provisions of these Regulations as well as the provisions of any law for the time being in force concerning ragging; and also to monitor and oversee the performance of the Anti-Ragging Squad in the prevention of ragging in the institution.

(ii) Every institution shall also constitute a smaller body to be known as the Anti-Ragging Squad to be nominated by the Head of the Institution with such representation as may be considered necessary for maintaining vigil, oversight and patrolling functions and shall remain mobile, alert and active at all times. Provided that the Anti-Ragging Squad shall have representation of various members of the campus community and shall have no outside representation.

(iii) It shall be the duty of the Anti-Ragging Squad to be called upon to make surprise raids on hostels and other places vulnerable to incidents of, and having the potential of, ragging and shall be empowered to inspect such places.

(iv) It shall also be the duty of the Anti-Ragging Squad to conduct an on-the-spot enquiry into any incident of ragging referred to it by the Head of the institution or any member of the faculty or any member of the staff or any student or any parent or guardian or any employee of a service provider or by any other person, as the case may be; and the enquiry report along with recommendations shall be submitted to the Anti-Ragging Committee for action under clause (a) of Regulation 9.1. Provided that the Anti-Ragging Squad shall conduct such enquiry observing a fair and transparent procedure and the principles of natural justice and after giving adequate opportunity to the student or students accused of ragging and other witnesses to place before it the facts, documents and views concerning the incident of ragging, and considering such other relevant information as may be required.

(v) Every institution shall, at the end of each academic year, to promote the objectives of these Regulations, constitute a Mentoring Cell consisting of students volunteering to be Mentors for freshers, in the succeeding academic year; and there shall be as many levels or tiers of Mentors as the number of batches in the institution, at the rate of one Mentor for six freshers and one Mentor of a higher level for six Mentors of the lower level.

(vi) Every University shall constitute a body to be known as Monitoring Cell on Ragging, which shall coordinate with the affiliated colleges and institutions under the domain of the University to achieve the objectives of these Regulations; and the Monitoring Cell shall call for reports from the Heads of institutions regarding the activities of the Anti-Ragging Committees, Anti - Ragging Squads, and the Mentoring Cells at the institutions, and it shall also keep itself abreast of the decisions of the District level Anti-Ragging Committee headed by the District Magistrate.

(vii) The Monitoring Cell shall also review the efforts made by institutions to publicize anti-ragging measures, soliciting of affidavits from parents/guardians and from students, each academic year, to abstain from ragging activities or willingness to be penalized for violations; and shall function as the prime mover for initiating action on the part of the appropriate authorities of the University for amending the Statutes or Ordinances or Bye-laws to facilitate the implementation of anti-ragging measures at the level of the institution.

(viii) Every institution shall take the following other measures, namely;

(a) Each hostel or a place where groups of students reside, forming part of the institution, shall have a full-time Warden, to be appointed by the institution as per the eligibility criteria laid down for the post reflecting both the command and control aspects of maintaining discipline and preventing incidents of

ragging within the hostel, as well as the softer skills of counselling and communicating with the youth outside the class-room situation; and who shall reside within the hostel, or at the very least, in the close vicinity thereof.

(b) The Warden shall be accessible at all hours and be available on telephone and other modes of communication, and for this purpose the Warden shall be provided with a mobile phone by the institution, the number of which shall be publicised among all students residing in the hostel.

(c) The institution shall review and suitably enhance the powers of Wardens; and the security personnel posted in hostels shall be under the direct control of the Warden, and their performance shall be assessed by them.

(d) The professional counsellors referred to under clause (o) of Regulation 6.1 of these Regulations shall, at the time of admission, counsel freshers and/or any other student(s) desiring counselling, in order to prepare them for the life ahead, particularly regarding life in hostels and, to the extent possible, also involve parents and teachers in the counselling sessions.

(i) The institution shall undertake measures for extensive publicity against ragging by means of audio-visual aids, counselling sessions, workshops, painting and design competitions among students and such other measures as it may deem fit.

(ii) To enable a student or any person to communicate with the Anti-Ragging Helpline, every institution shall permit unrestricted access to mobile phones and public phones in hostels and campuses, other than in classrooms, seminar halls, libraries, and in such other places that the institution may deem it necessary to restrict the use of phones.

(iii) The faculty of the institution and its non-teaching staff, which includes but is not limited to the administrative staff, contract employees, security guards and employees of service providers providing services within the institution, shall be sensitised towards the ills of ragging, its prevention and the consequences thereof.

(iv) The institution shall obtain an undertaking from every employee of the institution including all teaching and non-teaching members of staff, contract labour employed in the premises either for running canteen or as watch and ward staff or for cleaning or maintenance of the buildings/lawns and employees of service providers providing services within the institution, that s/he would report promptly any case of ragging which comes to her/his notice.

(v) The institution shall make a provision in the service rules of its employees for issuing certificates of appreciation to such members of the staff who report incidents of ragging, which will form part of their service record.

(vi) The institution shall give necessary instructions to the employees of the canteens and messing, whether that of the institution or that of a service provider providing this service, or their employers, as the case may be, to keep a strict vigil in the area of their work and to report the incidents of ragging to the Head of the institution or members of the Anti-Ragging Squad or members of the Anti-Ragging Committee or the Wardens, as may be required.

(vii) All Universities awarding a Degree in education at any level, shall be required to ensure that institutions imparting instruction in such Programmes or conducting training Programme for teachers include inputs relating to anti-ragging and the appreciation of the relevant human rights, as well as inputs on topics regarding sensitization against corporal punishments and checking of bullying amongst students, so that every teacher is equipped to handle at least the rudiments of the counselling approach.

(viii) Discreet random surveys shall be conducted amongst the freshers every fortnight during the first three months of the academic year to verify and cross-check whether the institution is indeed free of ragging or not, and for this purpose, the institution may design its own methodology of conducting such surveys.

e) The institution shall cause to have an entry, apart from those relating to general conduct and behaviour, made in the Migration/Transfer Certificate issued to the student while leaving the institution, as to whether the student has been punished for committing or abetting an act of ragging, as also whether the student has displayed persistent violent or aggressive behaviour or any inclination to harm others, during his course of study in the institution.

Notwithstanding anything contained in these Regulations about obligations and responsibilities about the authorities or members of bodies prescribed above, it shall be the general collective responsibility of all levels and sections of authorities or functionaries including members of the faculty and employees of the institution, whether regular or temporary, and employees of service providers providing service within the institution, to prevent or to act promptly against the occurrence of ragging or any incident of ragging which comes to their notice.

The Heads of institutions affiliated to a University or a constituent of the University, as the case may be, shall, during the first three months of an academic year, submit a weekly report on the status of compliance with Anti-Ragging measures under these Regulations, and a monthly report on such status thereafter, to the Vice-Chancellor of the University to which the institution is affiliated to or recognised by.

The Vice Chancellor of each University shall submit fortnightly reports of the University, including those of the Monitoring Cell on Ragging in case of an affiliating University, to the State Level Monitoring Cell.

7. Action to be taken by the Head of the institution

On receipt of the recommendation of the Anti-Ragging Squad or on receipt of any information concerning any reported incident of ragging, the Head of institution shall immediately determine if a case under the penal laws is made out and if so, either on his own or through a member of the Anti-Ragging Committee authorised by him in this behalf, proceed to file a First Information Report (FIR), within twenty four hours of receipt of such information or recommendation, with the police and local authorities, under the appropriate penal provisions relating to one or more of the following, namely;

- a) Abetment to ragging;
- b) Criminal conspiracy to rag;
- c) Unlawful assembly and rioting while ragging;
- d) Public nuisance created during ragging;
- e) Violation of decency and morals through ragging;
- f) Injury to body, causing hurt or grievous hurt;
- g) Wrongful restraint;
- h) Wrongful confinement;
- i) Use of criminal force;
- j) Assault as well as sexual offences or unnatural offences;
- k) Extortion;
- l) Criminal trespass;
- m) Offences against property;
- n) Criminal intimidation;
- o) Attempts to commit any or all of the above-mentioned offences against the victim(s);
- p) Threat to commit any or all of the above-mentioned offences against the victim(s);
- q) Physical or psychological humiliation;
- r) All other offences following from the definition of “Ragging”.

Provided that the Head of the institution shall forthwith report the occurrence of the incident of ragging to the District Level Anti-Ragging Committee and the Nodal officer of the affiliating University, if the

institution is an affiliated institution. Provided further that the institution shall also continue with its own enquiry initiated under clause 9 of these Regulations and other measures without waiting for action on the part of the police/local authorities, and such remedial action shall be initiated and completed immediately and in no case later than a period of seven days from the reported occurrence of the incident of ragging.

8. Duties and Responsibilities of the Commission and the Councils

(i) The Commission shall, for facilitating communication of information regarding incidents of ragging in any institution, take the following steps, namely;

The Commission shall establish, fund and operate a toll-free Anti-Ragging Helpline, operational round the clock, which could be accessed by students in distress owing to ragging-related incidents.

Any distress message received at the Anti-Ragging Helpline shall be simultaneously relayed to the Head of the Institution, the Warden of the Hostels, the Nodal Officer of the affiliating University, if the incident reported has taken place in an institution affiliated to a University, the concerned District authorities and if so required, the District Magistrate, and the Superintendent of Police, and shall also be web enabled to be in the public domain simultaneously for the media and citizens to access it.

The Head of the institution shall be obliged to act immediately in response to the information received from the Anti-Ragging Helpline as at sub-clause (b) of this clause.

The telephone numbers of the Anti-Ragging Helpline and all the important functionaries in every institution, Heads of institutions, faculty members, members of the anti-ragging committees and anti-ragging squads, district and sub-divisional authorities and state authorities, Wardens of hostels, and other functionaries or authorities where relevant, shall be widely disseminated for access or to seek help in emergencies.

The Commission shall maintain an appropriate database to be created out of affidavits, affirmed by each student and her/his parents/guardians and stored electronically by the institution, either on its own or through an agency to be designated by it; and such database shall also function as a record of ragging complaints received, and the status of the action taken thereon.

The Commission shall make available the database to a non-governmental agency to be nominated by the Central Government, to build confidence in the public and also to provide information on noncompliance with these Regulations to the Councils and to such bodies as may be authorised by the Commission or by the Central Government.

(ii) The Commission shall take the following regulatory steps, namely;

The Commission shall make it mandatory for the institutions to incorporate in their prospectus the directions of the Central Government or the State Level Monitoring Committee about prohibition and consequences of ragging, and that non-compliance with these Regulations and directions so provided shall be considered as lowering of academic standards by the institution, therefore making it liable for appropriate action.

(i) The Commission shall verify that the institutions strictly comply with the requirement of getting the affidavits from the students and their parents/guardians as envisaged under these Regulations. (ii) The Commission shall include a specific condition in the Utilisation Certificate, in respect of any financial assistance or grants-in-aid to any institution under any of the general or special schemes of the Commission, that the institution has complied with the anti-ragging measures.

(iii) Any incident of ragging in an institution shall adversely affect its accreditation, ranking or grading by NAAC or by any other authorised accreditation agencies while assessing the institution for accreditation, ranking or grading purposes.

(iv) The Commission may accord priority in financial grants-in-aid to those institutions, otherwise eligible to receive grants under section 12B of the Act, which report a blemish-less record in terms of there being no reported incident of ragging.

(v) The Commission shall constitute an Inter-Council Committee, consisting of representatives of the various Councils, the Non-Governmental agency responsible for monitoring the database maintained by the Commission under clause (g) of Regulation 8.1 and such other bodies in higher education, to coordinate and monitor the anti-ragging measures in institutions across the country and to make recommendations from time to time it shall meet at least once in six months each year.

(vi) The Commission shall institute an Anti-Ragging Cell within the Commission as an institutional mechanism to provide secretarial support for the collection of information and monitoring, and to coordinate with the State Level Monitoring Cell and University Level Committees for effective implementation of anti-ragging measures. The Cell shall also coordinate with the Non-Governmental agency responsible for monitoring the database maintained by the Commission appointed under clause (g) of Regulation 8.1.

9. Administrative action in the event of ragging

(i) The institution shall punish a student found guilty of ragging after following the procedure and in the manner prescribed hereunder:

The Anti-Ragging Committee of the institution shall take an appropriate decision regarding punishment or otherwise, depending on the facts of each incident of ragging and the nature and gravity of the incident

The Anti-Ragging Committee may, depending on the nature and gravity of the guilt established by the Anti-Ragging Squad, award to those found guilty one or more of the following punishments, namely: Suspension from attending classes and academic privileges. Withholding/ withdrawing scholarship/ fellowship and other benefits. Debarring from appearing in any test/ examination or other evaluation process. Withholding results. Debarring from representing the institution in any regional, national, or international meet, tournament, youth festival, etc. Suspension/ expulsion from the hostel. Cancellation of admission. Rustication from the institution for a period ranging from one to four semesters. Expulsion from the institution and consequent debarring from admission to any other institution for a specified period. Provided that where the persons committing or abetting the act of ragging are not identified, the institution shall resort to collective punishment.

An appeal against the order of punishment by the Anti-Ragging Committee shall lie, in case of an order of an institution affiliated to or a constituent part of a University, to the Vice-Chancellor of the University; in case of an order of a University, to its Chancellor. In case of an institution of national importance created by an Act of Parliament, to the Chairman or Chancellor of the institution, as the case may be. (iv) Where an institution, being a constituent of, affiliated to or recognised by a University, fails to comply with any of the provisions of these Regulations or fails to curb ragging effectively, such University may take any one or more of the following actions, namely: Withdrawal of affiliation/recognition or other privileges conferred.

(ii) Prohibiting such institution from presenting any student or students then undergoing any Programme of study therein for the award of any Degree/diploma of the University. Provided that where an institution is prohibited from presenting its student or students, the Commission shall make suitable arrangements for the other students so as to ensure that such students can pursue their academic studies. Withholding grants allocated to it by the University, if any withholding of grants is channelised through the University to the institution.

(a) Any other appropriate penalty within the powers of the University.

(1) Where in the opinion of the appointing authority, a lapse is attributable to any member of the faulty or staff of the institution, in the matter of reporting or taking prompt action to prevent an incident of ragging or who display an apathetic or insensitive attitude towards complaints of ragging, or who fail to take timely steps, whether required under these Regulations or otherwise, to prevent an incident or incidents of ragging, then such authority shall initiate School disciplinary action, in accordance with the prescribed procedure of the institution, against such member of the faulty or staff. Provided that where such lapse is attributable to the Head of the institution, the authority designated to appoint such Head shall take such School disciplinary action; and such action shall be without prejudice to any action that

may be taken under the penal laws for abetment of ragging for failure to take timely steps in the prevention of ragging or punishing any student found guilty of ragging.

(2) The Commission shall, in respect of any institution that fails to take adequate steps to prevent ragging or fails to act in accordance with these Regulations or fails to punish perpetrators or incidents of ragging suitably, take one or more of the following measures, namely: Withdrawal of declaration of fitness to receive grants under section 12B of the Act. Withholding any grant allocated. Declaring the institution ineligible for consideration for any assistance under any of the general or special assistance Programmes of the Commission. Informing the general public, including potential candidates for admission, through a notice displayed prominently in the newspapers or other suitable media and posted on the website of the Commission, declaring that the institution does not possess the minimum academic standards. Taking such other action within its powers as it may deem fit and imposing such other penalties as may be provided in the Act for such duration of time as the institution complies with the provisions of these Regulations. Provided that the action taken under this clause by the Commission against any institution shall be shared with all Councils.

(3) Provision exists for online filing of affidavits by students and their parents on a web portal created by UGC

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THE GOA UNIVERSITY STUDENTS' DISCIPLINE AND CONDUCT RULES 2018

Preamble

Students' indiscipline leads to serious issues, including ragging. It has been observed by Hon'ble Courts of Law and UGC that common places where indiscipline/ragging could occur include canteens and hostels. This necessitates relooking into disciplinary rules for hostel management as well as Disciplinary Rules by Goa University, probably in the year 1988. A proctorial system needs to be established as suggested by the Academic Council of the Goa University.

Whereas it is considered necessary and expedient to frame rules under which disciplinary action may be taken at various levels against students of the University Teaching Schools/Centres, established and maintained by Goa University.

The following Rules are framed under section 22 (q) of the Goa University Act, 1984, read with clause 5 of Statute no. 26.

Before proceeding further, the Committee would like to reproduce some important guidelines in this context:

Section 22 (q) of the GU Act, 1984, read with clause 5 of Statute 26, provides for the Maintenance of discipline among students of the University –

(1) All powers relating to discipline and disciplinary action in relation to students of the University shall vest in the Vice-Chancellor.

(2) The Vice-Chancellor may delegate all or any of his powers as he deems proper to the Registrar and to such other officers as he may specify in this behalf.

(3) Without prejudice to the generality of his powers relating to the maintenance of discipline and taking such action, as may seem to him appropriate for the maintenance of discipline, the Vice Chancellor may, in the exercise of his powers, by order, direct that any student or student be expelled or restricted for a specified period or be not admitted to a course or courses of study in a college, institution or Schools of the University for a stated period or be punished with fine for an amount to be specified in the order or be debarred from taking an examination or examinations conducted by the University, college, institution or Schools for one or more years, or that the results of the students or students concerned in the examination or examinations in which he or they have appeared be cancelled.

(4) *The Principals of the colleges, institutions, Head of Special Centres, Deans of Schools of the University shall have the authority to exercise all such disciplinary powers over the students in their respective colleges, institutions, Special Centres, Schools of the University as may be necessary for the proper conduct of such colleges, institutions, Special Centres, Schools of the University.*

(5) *Without prejudice to the powers of the Vice-Chancellor, the Principals and other persons specified in clause (4), detailed rules of discipline and proper conduct shall be made by the University. The Principals of colleges, institutions, Heads of Special Centres, Deans of Schools of Studies, and teaching faculties of the University may also make such supplementary rules as they deem necessary for the aforesaid purpose. Every student shall be supplied with a copy of the rules made by the University, and a copy of the supplementary rules shall be supplied to the students concerned.*

(6) *At the time of admission, every student shall be required to sign a declaration to the effect that he submits himself to the disciplinary jurisdiction of the Vice-Chancellor and other authorities of the University.*

Hon'ble Supreme Court of India delivered many judgements during 2001-2009 defining ragging and giving directives to curb the problems:

Any disorderly conduct whether by words spoken or written or by an act which the effect of teasing, treating or handling with rudeness any other student, indulging in rowdy or in disciplined activities which causes or is likely to cause annoyance, hardship or psychological harm or to raise fear or apprehension thereof in a fresher or a junior student or asking the students to do any act or perform something which such student will not do in the ordinary course and which has the effect of causing or generating a sense of shame or embarrassment to adversely affect the physique or psyche of a fresher or a junior student.

- ***Ragging is as severe a criminal act as rape.***
- *FIR will be filed without any delay.*
- *Such cases will be accorded priority trial.*
- ***Those found guilty may be fined up to Rs. 8,000/-***
- ***Those found guilty may be expelled for up to four semesters.***
- ***Those found guilty may be denied admission elsewhere.***
- ***Authorities are also accountable for any failure or delay.***
- ***Defaulter institutions are likely to lose grants.***

Important Clauses of UGC Regulations on CURBING THE MENACE OF RAGGING in Higher Educational Institutions 2009 to be noted by the students.

CLAUSE 3: WHAT CONSTITUTES RAGGING?

Ragging constitutes one or more of the following acts:

- a) Any conduct by any student or students, whether by words spoken or written or by an act which has the effect of teasing, treating, or handling with rudeness a fresher or any other student.*
- b) Indulging in rowdy or indisciplinary activities by any student or students which causes or is likely to cause annoyance, hardship, physical or psychological harm, or to raise fear or apprehension thereof in any fresher or any other student.*
- c) Asking any student to do any act which such student will not in the ordinary course do and which has the effect of causing or generating a sense of shame, torment, or embarrassment to adversely affect the physique or psyche of such fresher or any other student.*
- d) Any act by a senior student that prevents, disrupts or disturbs the regular academic activity of any other student or a fresher.*
- e) Exploiting the services of a fresher or any other student to complete the academic tasks assigned to an individual or a group of students.*
- f) Any act of financial extortion or forceful expenditure burden put on a fresher or any other student by other students.*
- g) Any act of physical abuse including all variants of it: sexual abuse, homosexual assaults, stripping, forcing obscene and lewd acts, gestures, causing bodily harm or any other danger to health or person; h) Any act or abuse by spoken words, emails, post, public insults which would also include deriving perverted pleasure, vicarious or sadistic thrill from actively or passively participating in the discomfiture to fresher or any other student.*
- h) Any act that affects the mental health and self-confidence of a fresher or any other student with or without an intent to derive a sadistic pleasure or show off power, authority or superiority by a student over any fresher or any other student.*

CLAUSE 7: ACTION TO BE TAKEN BY THE HEAD OF THE INSTITUTION:

On receipt of the recommendation of the Anti-Ragging Squad or on receipt of any information concerning any reported incident of ragging, the Head of Institution shall immediately determine if a case under the panel laws is made out and if so, either on his own or through a member of the Anti-Ragging Committee, authorised by him in this behalf, proceed to file a First Information Report (FIR), within twenty-four hours of receipt of such information or recommendation. with the police and local authorities, under the appropriate penal provisions relating to one or more of the following, namely;

- i. Abetment to ragging;*
- ii. Criminal conspiracy to rag;*
- iii. Unlawful assembly and rioting while ragging;*
- iv. Public nuisance created during ragging;*

- v. Violation of decency and morals through ragging;
- vi. Injury to body, causing hurt or grievous hurt;
- vii. Wrongful restraint;
- viii. Wrongful confinement;
- ix. Use of criminal force;
- x. Assault as well as sexual offences or unnatural offences;
- xi. Extortion;
- xii. Criminal trespass;
- xiii. Offences against property;
- xiv. Criminal intimidation;
- xv. Attempts to commit any or all of the above-mentioned offences against the victim(s);
- xvi. Threat to commit any or all of the above-mentioned offences against the victim(s);
- xvii. Physical or psychological humiliation;
- xviii. All other offences following from the definition of “ragging”

Provided that the Head of the Institution shall forthwith report the occurrence of the incident of ragging to the District Level Anti-Ragging Committee and the Nodal officer of the affiliating University, if the institution is an affiliated institution.

Provided further that the institution shall also continue with its own enquiry initiated under clause 9 of these Regulations and other measures without waiting for action on the part of the police/local authorities, and such remedial action shall be initiated and completed immediately and in no case later than a period of seven days from the reported occurrence of the incident of ragging.

CLAUSE 9: ADMINISTRATIVE ACTION IN THE EVENT OF RAGGING:

9.1 The institution shall punish a student found guilty of ragging after following the procedure and in the manner prescribed hereunder:

- a) The Anti-Ragging Committee of the institution shall take an appropriate decision regarding punishment or otherwise, depending on the facts of each incident of ragging and the nature and gravity of the incident as established in the recommendations of the Anti-Ragging Squad.*
- b) The Anti-Ragging Committee may, depending on the nature and gravity of the guilt established by the Anti-Ragging Squad, award, to those found guilty, one or more of the following punishments, namely;*
 - i. Suspension from attending classes and academic privileges.*
 - ii. Withholding/ withdrawing scholarship/ fellowship and other benefits.*
 - iii. Debarring from appearing in any test/ examination or other evaluation process.*
 - iv. Withholding results.*

- v. *Debarring from representing the institution in any regional, national, or international meet, tournament, youth festival, etc.*
 - vi. *Suspension/ expulsion from the hostel.*
 - vii. *Cancellation of admission.*
 - viii. *Rustication from the institution for a period ranging from one to four semesters.*
 - ix. *Expulsion from the institution and consequent debarring from admission to any other institution for a specified period. Provided that where the persons committing or abetting the act of ragging are not identified, the institution shall resort to collective punishment.*
- c) *An appeal against the order of punishment by the Anti-Ragging Committee shall lie,*
- (i) *in case of an order of an institution affiliated to or constituent part of a University, to the Vice Chancellor of the University;*
 - (ii) *in case of an order of a University, to its Chancellor.*
 - (iii) *in case of an institution of national importance created by an Act of Parliament, to the Chairman or Chancellor of the institution, as the case may be.*

The Goa University Students' Discipline and Conduct Rules 2018.

1. SHORT TITLE AND COMMENCEMENT

- (a) These Rules shall be called "The Goa University Students' Discipline and Conduct Rules 2018" hereafter referred to as the "Rules".
- (b) These Rules shall come into force with effect from the date of their notification.

2. APPLICATION OF RULES

These Rules shall apply to all students of the University whether admitted before the commencement of these Rules or after the commencement of these Rules.

- (a) Any breach of discipline and conduct committed by a student inside or outside the Goa University Campus shall fall under the purview of these Rules.
- (b) Without prejudice to the generality of the power to enforce discipline under Section 22 (q) of the Goa University Act, 1984 and Statute 26 thereunder, the acts mentioned in Rule 4 shall amount to acts of misconduct or indiscipline or both.
- (c) These rules are not meant to deny the democratic rights of the students to dissent/air their grievances/protest peacefully and lawfully.
- (d) Peaceful and lawfully conducted sit-ins/*dharanas* at a designated place with prior intimation to the University administration will not invite any punishment under these rules.

3. DEFINITIONS:

For the application of these Rules-

(a) 'School' means any teaching School established and maintained by the Goa University offering P.G. Degree/Diploma/Certificate/Integrated Courses and also includes Schools, Centres, Library, Hostels, Playgrounds, Canteens, Shopping Centres, Gymkhana, University Guest House, Administrative Offices, Staff quarters and the entire University campus.

(b) 'Student' means any person admitted to a School of the University as given in (a) above for receiving instructions either full-time or part-time and whose name is on the rolls of the University.

The word student, with reference to the context if required, shall also mean students.

(c) 'Teacher' means Dean, Director, Professor, Associate Professor, Assistant Professor, Warden of hostel, Librarian, Director of Physical Education, Assistant Director of Physical Education, Physical Culture Instructor, and Coaches, etc.

(d) 'Disciplinary Authority' means an authority competent to impose a penalty on a student under these Rules for any act of indiscipline or misconduct.

(e) 'Inquiry Authority' means a Committee appointed by the Vice-Chancellor or an Inquiry Officer appointed by the Vice-Chancellor to inquire into the charges of act/s of indiscipline or misconduct by a student or a group of students.

(f) 'Chief Proctor' means a senior teacher appointed by the Vice-Chancellor under the provisions of these Rules.

(g) 'Assistant Proctor' means a teacher appointed by the Vice-Chancellor under the provisions of these Rules.

4.0 ACTS OF MISCONDUCT AND INDISCIPLINE:

(a) Acts of misconduct and indiscipline Category-I:

i) Causing disturbance within the University premises, Laboratory or Reading Room, Common Room, Playground or Hostel.

ii) Any act leading to diverting the attention of the students from the Lectures or of the teacher from Teaching.

iii) Insubordination and/or disrespect to the teacher within or outside the University premises.

iv) Habitual inattention to classwork and assignments.

v) Disturbing a class from outside by loitering aimlessly in the corridors, making noise.

vi) Picking up a quarrel with the teaching or non-teaching staff or with other students.

vii) Using filthy language and abuses in the University premises or 'Sports-grounds'

viii) Smoking openly within the University campus.

ix) Playing any kind of musical instrument inside the class or outside during class hours.

- x) Hunger strikes, *dharnas*, group bargaining, and any other form of protest by blocking the entrance or exit of any of the academic and/or administrative complexes or disrupting the movements of any member of the University Community.
- xi) Furnishing false certificates or false information in any manner to the University.
- xii) Teasing or disrespectful behaviour or any misbehaviour with a boy/girl student, staff member/ visitor.
- xiii) Causing or colluding in the unauthorised entry of any person/guest into the Campus or in the unauthorised occupation of any portion of the University premises, including residential quarters/hostels or residence by any person.
- xiii) Unauthorised occupation of the hostel rooms or unauthorised acquisition and use of University furniture in one's hostel room or elsewhere.
- xiv) Damaging or defacing, in any form, any property of the University or the property of any member of the University community.
- xv) Not disclosing one's identity when asked to do so by a faculty member or employee or security staff of the University who is authorised to ask for such identity.
- xvi) Improper behaviour while on tour or excursion.
- xviii) Coercing the medical staff to render medical assistance to persons not entitled to the same or any other disorderly behaviour in the Health Centre of the University.
- xix) Blockade or forceful prevention of any normal movement of traffic, violation of security or safety rules notified by the University.
- xx) Littering of any kind of waste, including plastic waste, in the University buildings, grounds/roads/premises.
- xxi) Disturbing other students/ teachers using a mobile phone inside the class or outside during class hours.
- xxii) Driving and parking the vehicles on the University campus in violation of the guidelines to that effect.
- xxiii) Distributing any material related to political parties/movements.
- xxiv) Any other act which may be considered by the Vice-Chancellor or any other competent authority to be a minor act of violation of discipline and conduct.

(b) Acts of misconduct and indiscipline Category-II:

- i) Repetition of acts given under Category-I of indiscipline despite repeated warnings and penalties imposed.
- ii) Attending the University dressed in a manner contrary to social norms prevailing from time to time or violating the dress code, if any.
- iii) Indecent exposure in a proactive manner or behaving in a manner tending to rouse baser passions among the members of the same or opposite sex.

- v) Forcibly entering/ reaching places which have restricted entry or unauthorised handling of equipment or performing acts which would be a threat to one's life.
- vi) Instigating others to commit acts of indiscipline.
- vii) Engaging in any attempt at wrongful confinement of any member of the faculty, staff, student, or anyone camping inside the Campus.
- viii) Any Intimidation, insulting, or abusive behaviour towards a student, staff, or faculty, or any other person.
- ix) *Wanton destruction of University properties.*
- x) *Consuming or possessing narcotic drugs or other intoxicants or alcohol anywhere on the University premises.*
- xi) *Indulging in criminal acts of any kind under the law of the land, including gambling and possession of arms/weapons.*
- xii) *Arousing communal, caste or regional feelings, or creating disharmony among students.*
- xiii) *Demonstration of disloyalty to the country, its constitution, and its flag.*
- xiv) *Ragging of any kind tending to cause physical and mental torture to other students or forcing others to submit to indignity and nuisance.*
- xv) *All acts of violence and all forms of coercion such as gheraos, sit-ins, or any variation of the same which disrupt the normal academic and administrative functioning of the University, and/or any act which incites or leads to violence.*
- xvi) *Gheraos, laying siege or staging demonstrations around the residence of any member of the University Community or any other form of coercion, intimidation, or disturbance of the right to privacy of the residents of the campus.*
- xvii) *Sexual harassment of any kind, which shall also include: unwelcome sexual proposition/ advancements, sexually graphic comments of a body, unwelcome touching, patting, pinching, or leering of parts of the body or persistent offensive or unwelcome sexual jokes and/or comments.*
- xviii) *Committing forgery, tampering with the Identity Card or University records, impersonation, misusing University property (movable or immovable), documents and records, tearing of pages, defacing, burning or in any way destroying the books, journals, magazines and any material of the library, or unauthorised photocopying or possession of library books, journals, magazines or any other material.*
- xix) *Any act of moral turpitude.*
- xx) *Use of abusive, defamatory, derogatory, or intimidatory language against any member of the University Community.*
- xxi) *Any other act or acts which the Vice-Chancellor considers as major acts of misconduct and indiscipline.*

5.0 PUNISHMENT

The competent authority may impose any one or suitable combination of the following punishments on any student found guilty of any of the acts of indiscipline or misconduct mentioned under Category or Category-II as the case may be, in Rule 4.

Category-I:

- 1) Admonition/Reprimand.
- 2) Sending the student out of his class and not letting him into his class up to a maximum of two consecutive periods.
- 3) Marking the student absent for repeating the misconduct at Sr. No. 2.
- 4) Fine up to Rupees Twenty Thousand depending upon the gravity of the issue.
- 5) Recovery of any kind, such as scholarship/fellowship, any dues, cost of damages, etc.
- 6) Withdrawal of any or all facilities available to a student as per various Goa University Rules (such as Scholarship/Fellowship, Hostel, etc.) permanently or for a time period up to two semesters.
- 7) Stoppage of any or all academic processes.
- 8) Rustication up to two semesters and/or declaring any hostels, premises, buildings or the entire Goa University Campus out of bounds to any students.

Category-II:

- 1) Cancellation of admission or withdrawal of a Degree or denial of registration for a specified period. 2) Rustication up to four semesters and/or declaring any part or the entire Goa University Campus out of bounds.
- 3) Fine up to Rupees five thousand depending upon the gravity of the issue.
- 4) Expulsion.

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6.0 AUTHORITIES EMPOWERED TO IMPOSE PUNISHMENT AND APPELLATE AUTHORITIES:

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7.0 PROCTORIAL BOARD

- a. There shall be a Proctorial board for the University consisting of a Chief Proctor and two Proctors. The Proctors shall be appointed by the Vice-Chancellor as follows.
- One Assistant Professor.
- One Associate Professor.
- The tenure of the Proctors shall be for a period of three years. One of the Proctors shall be a woman. All the matters concerning indiscipline and misconduct by student/s shall be dealt with by the Proctorial Board.
- b. CHIEF PROCTOR**
- (1) The Chief Proctor shall be appointed from amongst the employees of the University, preferably of the rank of Professor, by the Executive Council on the recommendation of the Vice Chancellor. The Chief Proctor shall exercise such powers and perform such duties as may be assigned to him by these Rules or by the Vice-Chancellor. The tenure of the Chief Proctor shall be for a period of three years.
 - (2) When the office of Chief Proctor is vacant or when the Chief Proctor is, by reason of illness or absence for any other cause, unable to perform the duties of his office, the duties of the office shall be performed by one of the Assistant Proctors as the Vice-Chancellor may appoint for the purpose.
 - (3) The Chief Proctor shall be the competent authority to impose a fine/penalty as per the provisions of clause 6 of these Rules to the student/s on the recommendation of the Proctorial Board.
- c. POWERS OF THE PROCTORIAL BOARD AND PROCEDURES**
- (1) The Proctorial Board shall be the inquiry authority for all the case of misconduct/ indiscipline by the student/s and shall make suitable recommendations to the Vice-Chancellor as per the provisions of these Rules. This shall, however, exclude the cases to be handled by the ICC.
 - (2) The Proctorial Board (PB) is authorised to take up the cases *suo moto*. However, complainants shall be required to report any of the matters mentioned above within three days of the occurrence of the incident to the Chief Proctor. The student(s) charged shall be notified within four working days of the charge against her/him. It shall be the responsibility of the student(s) thus charged to submit in writing her/his defence within two working days to the PB. If the PB does not receive a defence within two working days, it will take an *ex parte* decision on the charge. The PB shall, however, have powers to relax the time-frames mentioned above based on the merit of the case in question.
 - (3) Under normal circumstances, the PB shall issue a show-cause notice within four working days of receiving a complaint, calling for an explanation within two working days. If the explanation is not received within two working days or any further time as may be granted, the PB may, by powers vested in it, record hearings from the other side and/or itself conduct an enquiry or may entrust the process of enquiry, including framing of charges and conducting the actual inquiry, to any other official of the University. However, if the situation so demands, the PB may convene an emergency meeting and call those concerned to depose before it immediately.
 - (4) Evidence to the PB shall normally be presented orally. The student charged may be required to provide written/material evidence if the PB so demands.
 - (5) It shall be the responsibility of the student charged and the complainant to arrange for their respective witnesses to give oral evidence or to submit any written statements/material evidence in their defence. A Witness giving oral evidence may be cross-examined by the PB. A witness not available for cross-examination may submit evidence in writing. The PB shall not consider evidence

from persons who are not prepared to have their names revealed to the PB. The names of persons appearing as evidence/witness shall be kept confidential.

- (6) The PB shall have the power to determine the order of proceedings and to exclude any material which appears irrelevant or repetitive or even seek clarification on oral/written submissions/material evidence.
- (7) The student charged will be invited to be present with a representative [optionally and who shall be another bona fide student only] whenever oral evidence is being heard. Representation through legal counsel/lawyer shall NOT be allowed in any case to any of the parties. Non-attendance of the student charged, or her/his representative, shall not bar the PB from proceeding ahead. The PB may, at its discretion, adjourn its proceedings in order to enable the student charged or the representative to be present.
- (8) The PB may adjourn a hearing to require a witness to attend for cross-examination. Where a witness who, in the opinion of the PB, is vital, fails to attend, the PB may, at its discretion, postpone its deliberations or even continue with its proceedings. The PB may also adjourn/ proceed with a case where it thinks that its proceedings are being impeded by any circumstance beyond its control.
- (9) The PB shall meet to consider an adjourned case, as soon as it is feasible, and not later than 15 days after the adjournment, although the case may not be determined at the resumed meeting. Where it is not reasonably practicable for the same members to attend the PB meeting reconvened to hear an adjourned case, it may co-opt one or two additional members to form the quorum.
- (10) The PB is authorised to invite members where it deems necessary. However, the members so invited shall not have voting rights.

d. GENERAL

- (1) No punishment shall ordinarily be imposed on a student unless the PB has followed normal procedures, including due opportunity to the student(s) charged with an offence.
- (2) The PB shall draw up:
 - I) the substance of the imputation of major acts of indiscipline into definite and distinct articles of charge.
 - II) a statement of imputation of acts of indiscipline in support of each article of charge, which shall contain-
 - a) a statement of all relevant facts, including any admission or confession made by the student (to be signed by the concerned student/s)
 - b) a list of documents by which and a list of witnesses by whom the articles of charge are proposed to be sustained. (to be signed by the concerned witness).
- (3) The Inquiry Authority shall prepare the report of inquiry which shall contain: -
 - a) The articles of charge and the statement of imputation of acts of major indiscipline.
 - b) The defence of the student, if any, in respect of each article of charge.
 - c) An assessment of the evidence in respect of each article of charge, separately in respect of each student.
 - d) The finding on each article of charge and the reasons thereof.
- (4) In case the Vice-Chancellor or any Competent Authority is of the opinion that is based on the available material and evidence on record, a prima facie case exists against a student, s/he may order suspension of the student, including withdrawal of any or all facilities available to a bona fide student, pending inquiry.
- (5) Notwithstanding any punishment mentioned above, the Vice-Chancellor may, keeping in view the gravity/nature of misconduct/act of indiscipline, the manner and the circumstances in which the

misconduct/indiscipline has been committed, award a punishment in excess of, or less than or other than what has been mentioned thereon for reasons to be recorded.

- (6) The Office of the Chief Proctor shall immediately report its decision to all the officials concerned for necessary action. It shall also report annually to the Vice-Chancellor and any such body that the Vice-Chancellor deems fit, on all cases arbitrated by it during the preceding academic year.

8.0 PLACING THE REPORTS OF INQUIRY BEFORE THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL.

- (i) The Vice-Chancellor, on the receipt of the record of inquiry from the Inquiry Authority, shall cause the records to be placed before the Executive Council at its next meeting or at a special meeting, if necessary.
- (ii) The Executive Council, after due consideration of the report and record of inquiry with the recommendation of the Vice-Chancellor, shall pass such order as may be considered just and necessary.
- (iii) The Registrar of the University shall then communicate the orders of the Executive Council to the student if the decision is to rusticate the student.
- (iv) If the student rusticated was allowed to appear for the University Examination with a condition that the results will be withheld until the completion of the inquiry and the decision of the Executive Council thereon, the Registrar shall inform the Controller of Examinations that the result of the student shall not be announced.

9.0 APPEAL

- (i) Student/s shall be allowed to appeal against the fine/penalty imposed by the competent authority subject to the provisions of Rule 6.0. However, such an appeal shall be preferred by the concerned student/s within ten working days after the receipt of the order of the competent authority.
- (ii) There shall be no appeal against the order of the Executive Council where the student/s is/are subjected to expulsion from the University or is subjected to a monetary fine by the EC. The decision of the Executive Council shall be final.

10.0 ACT/ACTS OF INDISCIPLINE MISCONDUCT OUTSIDE THE UNIVERSITY CAMPUS:

- i) The University shall not ordinarily take cognisance of act/acts of indiscipline committed by a student outside the University campus.
- ii) If a student is arrested or detained by orders of a magistrate on a charge of a criminal act involving moral turpitude committed outside the campus, the Vice-Chancellor, after verifying the fact of such arrest and detention, shall place her/him under suspension until s/he is released on bail or otherwise.
- iii) If a student is sentenced to imprisonment for an offence involving moral turpitude, the Vice-Chancellor shall place her/him under suspension.
- iv) The Vice-Chancellor shall place the matter before the Executive Council, which shall rusticate her/him from the University.
- v) If on appeal, the conviction is set aside, her/his rustication shall post facto cease.

11.0 INTERPRETATION

In case of a dispute with regard to the interpretation of any of the Rules mentioned above, the

12.0 VIGILANCE

Do not pay bribes. If any person from this University asks for a bribe, or if you have any information on corruption in this University, or if you are a victim of corruption in this University, you can complain to the vigilance officer of the University. The Vigilance officer of this University is responsible for active vigilance and investigating corruption complaints. 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Ethical Guidelines to be followed by faculty, students and other research staffs for publishing research work. (Approved by the Executive Council on 28 Jun 2024)

- The research involving collection of “Primary Data” relating to animal and human subject as well as genetically modified organism (GMO) is required to obtain approval of relevant Goa University Ethics Committee, prior to the start of research, following the due procedure.
- Any study involving Clinical trials shall have to be registered with the concerned regulatory body.
- If it is reported to or having found by the concerned Deans and Vice Deans of schools, that any kind of manipulation of the instrumental data, material, and data used, the researcher shall be liable to face actions as decided by the Authorities.
- Plagiarism, including self-Plagiarism, will not be tolerated and strict action will be taken as per the provisions of the relevant Statute or Ordinance.
- If researcher is using reproduced figures and tables from a research journal/book, a written permission from the author/publisher is required to be taken, however if the data is published by government/public agencies and is available in the public domain then it can be used by the researcher with proper citation.
- Submission of the same article in two or more journals simultaneously is an unethical practice and the same shall be avoided.
- There shall not be any guest author (the one who has not contributed for the Research) or ghost author (the one who has contributed however his/her name is not included as author) to your research paper. The order of corresponding and co-author/s shall be decided in advance and shall be in accordance with the contribution that each one makes.

Since Ph.D. is awarded for the original and independent work by the research scholar, if a paper is published out of the Ph.D. work of a research scholar, the first author shall ordinarily be research scholar and the corresponding author shall ordinarily be the research guide. If more than one research scholar is working in the R & D project and

everyone is involved in the data generation and processing then all the names of the research scholars shall be included in the publication, in the order of their contribution. The PI shall decide on the contribution of authors and inclusion of authors' order.

- Articles published based on the research findings of the Ph.D. work shall include guide/co-guide as co-author/s.
- The researcher shall ensure that there are no conflicts of interests as regards the results published.
- The researchers shall not publish in predatory/cloned journals.
- The faculty and research staff who have been dismissed/terminated from the University services, shall not use Goa University affiliation for publication/funding/consultancy and for any other academic purpose except, where the publication was submitted before the dismissal/termination of services. Such violators are liable for legal actions by the University. The serving faculty shall not collaborate with dismissed faculty member/s for any research. However, if the dismissed/terminated faculty has joined other institute and uses other institute's address for correspondence then the serving faculty of the University can collaborate and publish with dismissed/terminated faculty.
- Violators of these Guidelines shall be liable for punishments or penalties prescribed in OA-29.
